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Move to curb e-bike fires and tragic accidents

E-bike safety checks and enforcement would be a key role of the new city agency Mayor Adams is contemplating to regulate New York's growing food and package delivery industry

Deputy Mayor Meera Joshi - who is leading Adams' push to design and establish what some informally call the Department of Sustainable Delivery - told the Daily News the agency "will regulate new forms of delivery transit and ensure their safety."

"The equipment that you're going to use to do that delivery has to be inspected," said Joshi. "There has to be some oversight to ensure that it's safe."

Joshi, who headed the city's Taxi &

Limousine Commission from 2014 to 2019 under former mayor Bill de Blasio, likened the proposed delivery department to her former agency

The TLC requires all Ubers, Lyfts, taxis and liveries to undergo regular safety inspections and adhere to equipment rules above and beyond those of ordinary cars on the street.

E-bikes, Joshi said, are a "tragic example" of what happens in the absence of such

"They came in [to the city] quickly, because they met a need of workers to have cheap mobility and to meet the demands of an industry that is based completely on time and rewards for fast delivery," Joshi said.

"But the tragic truth is, nobody did the check around the safety, and we have an opportunity to prevent the next e-bike tragedy by ensuring that before you can deliver using equipment, there is an authorized specification that that equipment meets when it comes to safety."

Full data aren't available yet for the number of traffic deaths involving e-bike and e-mobility devices in 2023 - but as of October, 18 people had been killed on e-bikes or e-mobility devices.

That partial-year data suggested e-bike and e-mobility deaths are rising.

In 2022, the city says such devices most widely used by delivery workers were involved in 21 deaths. In 2021, the first year for which Vision Zero data e-bike and e-mobility data are available, the devices were involved in 15 deaths.



The city's Department of Transportation currently sets rules as to where e-bikes and mopeds are allowed to operate and the speeds at which they are allowed to travel.

The DOT has minimal enforcement capabilities, however. It relies on the NYPD to enforce the rules – including such tasks as keeping high-powered mopeds out of the city's bike lane network.

The growth of the e-bike delivery business has also brought deadly lithium-ion battery fires.

Eighteen people died in e-bike battery fires in the city in 2023 – mostly in houses or apartments where poorly designed after-market batteries were being charged. The Fire Department early in February shut down an e-bike battery factory in

Queens where inspectors believed a fire was imminent.

The boom in home delivery that began with the COVID-19 pandemic has brought a spike in the number of trucks and delivery bikes and mopeds on city streets.

Approximately 5 million packages were delivered by cargo bike in 2022, the most recently available data from the Department of Transportation show.

App-based food delivery is harder to quantify, but the city estimates the industry has grown to employ roughly 60,000 people.

"We don't know how many pieces of equipment are traveling throughout our streets delivering goods," Joshi said.

The proposed agency could become

home to other city initiatives on delivery issues.

The Adams administration has been pushing to use cargo bikes in place of delivery trucks for last-mile delivery. The city has also sought suggestions for ways to move local freight on city waterways, and to legalize four-wheeled truck-like e-bikes.

Joshi said she foresees the proposed agency as a "front door," issuing licenses and promulgating rules for businesses that want to operate delivery services in the five boroughs. The department – whether it's a stand-alone agency or a division of an existing agency remains to be seen, Joshi said – would require businesses to apply for licenses to run app-based delivery services, whether they use e-bikes, regular bikes, or,

at some future point, robots or drones.


Joshi said she hoped a licensing body for the delivery business would add an incentive for delivery companies to follow the rules.

"If doing business in New York means that you need to get a license from a New York City agency, and that license comes with certain requirements around your safety record, then you start to align those two things," Joshi said.

"It is [a] void in jurisdiction that we want to solve for."

The next steps in the agency's establishment are being worked out. "The conversations with City Council have already started," Joshi said when asked about a time line.

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An attempt to learn more about the deadly toxins kicked into New York City's atmosphere after the 9/11 terror attacks has so far been shut down by city government, with two key agencies claiming they have no information on the matter.

Freedom of Information Law requests to NYC Emergency Management and the Environmental Protection Department – lead agencies in the city's investigation of Ground Zero air quality – asked for whatever data former Mayor Rudy Giuliani was aware of about toxic chemicals at Ground Zero in the months after the Sept. 11, 2001, terror attacks.

The two agencies closed out the requests last month without providing any information.

"This agency does not have the records

requested," Emergency Management and the Environmental Protection Department both said in a curt, three-sentence response to attorneys Andrew Carboy and Matthew McCauley's FOIL request.

The request asked for "documents, reports, assessments" about the toxins, dust and fumes that came from the destroyed World Trade Center and other information about future health threats to 9/11 first responders and survivors.

Carboy and McCauley have submitted similar FOIL requests to other city agencies, which are still being reviewed, a city official with knowledge of the issue said.

According to the lawyers' spurned requests, the other agencies asked to provide documents include the Design and Construction Department, the Health Department, the mayor's office, the City Council and the Law Department.

Uncovering the paperwork has posed a

challenge because many documents at the time weren't digitized, requiring the agencies to dig into decades-old paper records, said the city official.

Carboy and McCauley issued the FOIL requests on behalf of 9/11 Health Watch and the families of first responders who died of 9/11 illnesses, including Firefighter Robert Fitzgibbon and NYPD Detective Luis Alvarez.

Retired NYPD detective and 9/11 responder Alvarez testified during a House Judiciary Committee in 2019. Frail, gaunt and racked with a 9/11 cancer, Alvarez testified to Congress demanding an extension of the September 11th Victim Compensation Fund. Alvarez lost his fight with cancer a month after he testified.

Carboy is appealing the FOIL denial. He says he is stunned that the city would claim it has no records about the terror attacks that are still killing scores of city "What's harder to believe? The city's pronouncements that the air in lower Manhattan was safe to breathe following the 9/11 attacks or that the two city agencies trusted to evaluate air quality and provide the results to the public now have no records of those tasks?" Carboy asked.

Benjamin Chevat, director of 9/11 Health Watch, found the city's response "simply preposterous."

Emergency Management "claims they have no records – zero, nada, zilch – to respond with," Chevat said. "The [Emergency Management] director stood at Mayor Giuliani's side through the days following 9/11, and they say there are no records?"

If the FOIL appeal is denied, the attorneys plan on taking other legal action.

An estimated 400,000 people were exposed to Ground Zero toxins on 9/11



and the days that followed, including 91,000 first responders, 57,000 residents who lived south of Canal St. and 15,000 students and administrators at lower Manhattan schools, according to city statistics.

Besides any and all reports, memos and studies shared with the Giuliani administration after 9/11, Carboy is also asking for anything connected with the infamous "Harding memo" which was referenced in a 2007 New York Times article, but never released publicly.

The October 2001 memo to then-Deputy Mayor Robert Harding warned that the city could face as many as 10,000 liability claims, "including toxic tort cases that might arise in the next few decades."

A U.S. Environmental Protection Agency report in 2003 harshly criticized Christine Todd Whitman, who headed the EPA in 2001, for telling people in New York

just seven days after the terror attacks that the "air is safe to breathe" before she had scientific evidence to support the claim.

Whitman, a former GOP governor of New Jersey, apologized in 2016 for her role, but insisted that she never lied about the air quality and repeated that she was simply passing on information given to her by government scientists.

New York Rep. Jerrold Nadler and former Rep. Carolyn Maloney, both Manhattan Democrats, have long asked for these documents to be released, and sent a letter to Mayor Adams last February asking that the vaults to this information be opened.

"It is long past time for full disclosure of the city's records," they wrote in the letter. "While more than 20 years have passed, we still do not know the full impact of that day and the aftermath on the health of thousands of New Yorkers, and the full extent of what the city knew at the time." In their letter, the legislators said they understood Adams administration officials are "concerned" about the city's liability in the matter.

"Releasing the records will likely help to save lives," they wrote.

In July, Adams agreed to sit down and discuss their longstanding request.

But when the meeting took place, city officials said they wouldn't release the documents without significant immunities and protections because the information could open them up to lawsuits and "embarrassment," a source with knowledge of the talks said.

An email to Adams, NYC Emergency Management and the Environmental Protection Department regarding the FOIL denial was not immediately answered. A city spokeswoman said several agencies are continuing to review requests for these documents from attorneys and legislators.

Carboy said acquiring the information isn't about litigation. More than 20 years later, it would be tough to prove who or what caused the victims' injuries and illnesses – and besides, he said, the more than 50,000 survivors who have already received money from the September 11th Victim Compensation Fund have agreed not to sue the city.

Instead, Carboy said, the issue is about finding answers to unanswered questions.

"I am struck, two decades on, by the large number of new clients who question the circumstances by which they, and hundreds of thousands of others, were exposed to contaminants while, simultaneously, returning to work and their homes reassured by City Hall of the air's safety," Carboy said. "Why were those assurances made, given what we now know?

"We hope to obtain answers to the questions the public continues to have."



'Wanted for murder' at 15

Suspected third gunman in fatal Bronx subway shooting

Cops have identified a 15-year-old boy as the third gunman in a Bronx subway station shooting that left one dead and five wounded as new details emerged about the conflict between two warring gangs that sparked the deadly violence, police said Saturday.

The teen, a Bronx resident, was identified hours after his alleged accomplice, 16-year-old Langel Jones, was ordered held without bail on murder charges for the Monday night gang-related shooting at the Mount Eden station on the No. 4 line.

A 14-year-old boy who swapped shots with the two teens and was wounded in a barrage of bullets is also in custody.

Cops are circulating a wanted poster about the 15-year-old, stating that he is "wanted for murder." His name is being withheld by the Daily News because he is a minor and so far not criminally charged.

The teen is believed to be a member of the "D Block" crew, which often clashes with the "Burnside" crew, cops said. The three teens opened fire on the train as it entered the station, then continued to shoot as they ran out onto the platform, cops said.

Jones and his accomplice were firing from the south end of the platform while the 14-year-old was shooting from the north end. A "chance encounter" between the gang members sparked the shooting, cops said.

An estimated 19 shots were fired, hitting six people, most of them bystanders caught in the crossfire.

Jones was charged as an adult with murder, assault, reckless endangerment and other charges.

One of the bullets the teen fired struck 35-year-old Mexican immigrant Obed Beltran-Sanchez in the chest, prosecutors say. Beltran-Sanchez died at St. Barnabas Hospital. Five other people between 14 and 71 years old were wounded.

Beltran-Sanchez was seated on the train and stepped out the door when he heard a commotion and was hit by a stray bullet, NYPD Chief of Detectives Joseph Kenny said Thursday.

"He's just a gentleman riding the

train," Kenny said. "He made the mistake of looking out onto the platform to see what was going on and he ends up getting killed"

Video recovered by police shows Beltran-Sanchez lying mortally wounded on the platform as people walk past him, Kenny said.

"It's heartbreaking to see the video of him laying on the platform dying," he said.

Jones was "seen along with another individual firing weapons at a third individual who fires back," prosecutors said at his arraignment.

The 15-year-old remained at large Saturday. He and Jones, who are both members of D Block crew, opened fire on the 14-year-old Burnside member as they sought payback for a Jan. 15 gang-related shooting the younger teen allegedly committed, police said.

D Block stands for Davidson Ave., Kenny said. The earlier shooting happened outside a Davidson Ave. bodega and the 14-year-old was among four others who opened fire on three men near the corner. One of the victims, 17, was hit in the lower right leg and was taken to St. Barnabas Hospital for treatment. He was very uncooperative with police when questioned, cops said.

Kenny said that bullets collected on the train platform matched bullets recovered from the Davidson Ave. shooting.

The 14-year-old is currently facing charges for the Jan. 15 shooting, but hasn't been charged with the train shooting. None of the guns used in the firefight were recovered, Kenny said.

The two crews may be responsible for five separate shootings or incidents of shots fired in and around Davidson Ave., police believe.

The longstanding beef between the two gangs is over "typical nonsense," Kenny said.

"It's over drill rapping and disrespect," Kenny said. "The usual taunts."

Beltran-Sanchez planned to return to his home in Mexico next year. He is survived by his wife, two children ages 12 and 7, and his parents, said Mexican news outlet La Silla Rota.

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






Nasty crash on nasty day sends 2 cops to hospital

St. Patrick's Cathedral held a rare Mass of Reparation on Saturday after the Archdiocese of New York claimed mourners at a funeral service for trans icon Cecilia Gentili last week engaged in "scandalous behavior."

St. Patrick's pastor, the Rev. Enrique Salvo, said that at Timothy Cardinal Dolan's request, the Mass was offered to pray for forgiveness for what some Catholics considered a desecration of the historic Midtown house of worship.

"Thanks to so many who have let us know they share our outrage over the scandalous behavior at a funeral here at St. Patrick's Cathedral earlier this week. The cathedral only knew that family and friends were requesting a funeral Mass for a Catholic, and had no idea our welcome and prayer would be degraded in such a sacrilegious and deceptive way," Salvo said Saturday in a statement.

"That such a scandal occurred at 'America's Parish Church' makes it worse."

Dolan has not spoken about the funeral.

Priests holding the service on Thursday

were reportedly not told that Gentili was trans.

Joseph Zwilling, a spokesman for the archdiocese, said the church didn't take issue with Gentili's sexual identity, but the actions of the mourners.

Outraged Catholics complained on social media that attendees wore racy outfits and cursed openly at the podium while paying tribute to Gentili, 52, a renowned trans activist and award-winning author, former sex worker and actress.

Mourners also jokingly identified Gentili as a "saint" and changed the lyrics to some Catholic songs to honor the LGBTQ advocate.

Among the mourners was "Pose" star Billy Porter, who, the group CatholicVote said on X, opened the service "with a song mocking the Our Father prayer."

The group went on to say the service was a "mockery of the Christian faith INSIDE St. Patrick's Cathedral."

Ceyeye Doroshow, who organized the memorial, admitted to The New York Times that she did not mention Gentili was trans to St. Patrick's officials and kept her identity "under wraps." Organizers did put out an extensive press release advertising the funeral at the church.

More than 1,000 people attended the service, which was live streamed on the Trans Equity YouTube channel. Many of the mourners were trans and were seen wearing miniskirts, halter tops, fishnet stockings and fur stoles.

So many people showed up at the "homegoing service" that the Rev. Edward Dougherty, who presided over the Mass, commented on the size of the crowd.

"Except on Easter Sunday, we don't really have a crowd that is this well turned out, you know?" Dougherty said during the service.

Gentili's family on Saturday pushed back at St. Patrick's, saying the funeral brought "precious life and radical joy to the cathedral in historic defiance of the church's hypocrisy and anti-trans hatred."

"Cecilia Gentili's funeral service, which filled the pews in ways the cathedral only can during Easter service and NYPD funerals, was a reflection of the love she had for her community and a testament to the impact of her tireless advocacy," family members said in a statement to the Daily News.

"Her heart and hands reached those the sanctimonious church continues to belittle, oppress and chastise, and she changed the material conditions for countless people, including unhoused people and those who needed health care. The only deception present at St. Patrick's Cathedral is that it claims to be a welcoming place for all," they said.

On Thursday attendees had heralded the cathedral's hosting of the funeral as a pivotal turn in the church's treatment of trans Catholics.

Catholics have long excluded queer and trans people, and the national conference of Catholic bishops in the U.S. rejects the concept of gender transition. However, the Vatican announced in October that the church would allow trans people to be baptized and serve as godparents under some circumstances.

In 1989, thousands stormed St. Patrick's Cathedral in opposition to the Catholic Church's policies on homosexuality, HIV/AIDS and abortion.

Catholics held a Mass of Reparation in Brooklyn in November to cleanse Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary Church.

The Brooklyn Diocese said the church was desecrated when someone filmed a sexually provocative music video inside the house of worship.

Impasse over ceasefire

Qatar: 'Humanitarian part' is sticking point in Israel-Hamas deal

RAFAH, Gaza Strip – Talks on a potential ceasefire deal in Gaza "have not been progressing as expected" in the past few days after good progress in recent weeks, key mediator Qatar said Saturday, as Israel's prime minister accused the Hamas militant group of not changing its "delusional" demands.

Speaking during the Munich Security Conference in Germany, Qatar's prime minister, Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdurrahman Al Thani, noted difficulties in the "humanitarian part" of the negotiations.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, who is under pressure to bring home remaining hostages taken in the Oct. 7 Hamas attack, said he sent a delegation to ceasefire talks in Cairo earlier in the week at President Biden's request, but doesn't see the point in sending them again.

Hamas wants a permanent ceasefire in Gaza and the release of Palestinians held by Israel.

Netanyahu also pushed back against international concern about a planned Israeli ground offensive in Rafah, a city on southern Gaza's border with Egypt. He said "total victory" against Hamas requires the offensive, once people living there evacuate to safe areas. Where they will go in largely devastated Gaza is not clear.

New airstrikes in central Gaza on Saturday killed more than 40 people and wounded at least 50, according to hospital officials. Israel's military said it carried out strikes against Hamas.

Five people were killed in an Israeli airstrike that targeted a house outside Khan Younis in the south, according to health officials, and an additional five people were killed in an airstrike north of Rafah.

Israel's offensive was triggered by the Oct. 7 attack that killed some 1,200 people in Israel and took 250 others hostage.

The Gaza Health Ministry on Saturday raised the overall death toll in Gaza to 28,858, saying the bodies of 83 people killed in Israeli bombardments were brought to hospitals in the previous 24 hours.

The war has displaced some 80% of Gaza's population and sparked a humanitarian crisis. More than half of Gaza's 2.3 million people are packed into Rafah, which Israel portrays as the last stronghold of Hamas fighters.

Meanwhile, Israel's military said it had arrested 100 suspected Hamas fighters at Nasser Hospital in Khan Younis, Gaza's second-largest city. Israel's defense minister has said at least 20 of those detained were involved in the Oct. 7 attack.

The Gaza Health Ministry said troops turned the hospital into "military barracks" and detained a large number of medical staff. Israel says it does not target patients or doctors, but staffers say the facility is under heavy fire.

Nour Abou Jameh was among the thousands of Palestinians sheltering at the hospital who were forced to leave in the past week.

"Shooting and shelling was coming from all directions," Jameh said. "When we left at night, bodies were in the streets, and even tanks moved on them and crushed them."

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'Sudden death'? Nyet!

Putin critic Navalny was murdered, dissident's team insists

The mother of Russian opposition leader Alexei Navalny, who died Friday at the age of 47, was told Saturday her son was killed by "sudden death syndrome" – a claim his team has waved off as untrue, alleging instead that Russian President Vladimir Putin's nemesis was murdered.

Lyudmila Navalnaya was also told her son's body would not be returned until officials completed their investigation, his spokeswoman Kira Yarmysh told Reuters. That's despite the fact that Navalny's team was informed earlier in the day that the probe was done and that it uncovered no evidence to suggest that anything criminal had occurred.

Yarmysh added that one of Navalny's lawyers was also told no cause of death had yet been confirmed.


"It's obvious that they are lying and doing everything they can to avoid handing over the body," Yarmysh wrote on X, noting that Navalny's team has demanded his body "be handed over to his family immediately."

Navalny's lawyer traveled alongside the Kremlin critic's mother to the Polar Wolf arctic penal colony, about 1,200 miles from Moscow, braving frigid temperatures in a bid to learn more about his death. They were told his body was at Salekhard morgue, but the facility was closed when they arrived. Officials subsequently "assured them [the morgue] is working and Navalny's body is there," Yarmysh said.

"The lawyer called the phone number which was on the door," she continued. "He was told he was the seventh caller today. Alexei's body is not in the morgue."

Navalny, a former lawyer, fell unconscious and died Friday following a walk at the remote artic prison, where he was serving a 30-year sentence, authorities said. His mother on Saturday was given an official notice listing his time of death as 2:17 p.m. local time, Yarmysh said.

"Navalny was murdered. We still don't



know how we'll keep on living, but together, we'll think of something," said Maria Pevchikh, head of the board of Navalny's Anti-Corruption Foundation.

Navalny was initially arrested in

January 2021 upon returning from a hospital in Germany, where he had been recuperating from what his team called an assassination attempt carried out by the Kremlin. His followers revealed he initially fell ill during a flight from Tomsk, Russia, to Moscow in August 2020, with several labs around the world confirming nerve-agent poisoning to be the cause.

At that time, he was sentenced to more than two years in prison for violating probation. Then, in March 2022, Navalny was ordered to spend nine years at a high-security facility on fraud and contempt charges, alleged infractions his team has repeatedly called politically motivated

He was handed an additional 19 years this past summer, that time on charges of extremism relating to his anti-corruption foundation.

Russian officials have repeatedly denied any involvement in the poisoning as well as his recent death.

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MOVEMENT, AT LAST, ON Demolition OK'd for 23-story apartment tower in Washington

A 23-story apartment building could finally be coming to the long-abandoned lot above the 181st St. A train station in Washington Heights after the city approved a demolition permit Feb. 14.

Developers want to construct a 164unit, 435-foot-tall building on the property located at 524 Fort Washington Ave. and 29 Overlook Terrace, which includes a vacant former synagogue above a rocky outcrop.

That's according to recent filings with the Department of Buildings, which also indicate several floors could be used as a school. Plans for the proposed new building, first reported in 2022, show about 15 stories would rise above Fort Washington Ave. and tower over nearby buildings - as well as Bennett Park, which is located directly across the street and occupies the highest natural point

'Nothing's been set in stone just yet," said Nathan Shapiro of Bizzi & Partners, one of the developers behind the project. "Everything's still in review and we still have to see what's going to happen."

Bizzi & Partners and fellow developers Sumaida & Khurana bought the land for a



reported \$12 million in 2022.

Shapiro did not have any comment on a timeline for the project, but a contractor would need to pull the relevant work permits before demolition work could begin. The application for the new building, last filed in January, has not yet been approved by the DOB.

The project, which is also referred to as "1 Bennett Park," would cost over \$100 million to build, according to filings. It includes 87 parking spots and over 130,000 square feet

of community facilities; space for a school is detailed on eight of the lower floors, though Shapiro would not confirm anything about a possible new school.

When asked about the potential effect on the 90-plus-year-old subway station it would be built above, Shapiro said "there will be no impact" and they are in touch with the MTA.

City Realty reported last October it would be the largest new condominium in Upper Manhattan and published renderings of the huge brickwork façade.

None of the Washington Heights residents the Daily News spoke to were aware of the plans. That may be because the developers didn't have to go through a rezoning process to build so unusually high for the area - the other buildings around the park top out at six stories - since the zoning already allows it for such irregularly-shaped lots.


But the prospect of the new 23-story building has rankled many residents, who said they worried about the design and implications for Bennett Park, the 181st St. subway station, adjacent buildings and the neighborhood at large.

"Build better buildings and you'll undoubtedly face less opposition from the communities in which you situate them," said Ted Kirschner, 52, a creative director who has lived in Washington Heights for 11 years.

"But drop another bland box with cheap brickwork and no discernible character designed by someone paying more attention to a spreadsheet than a community and watch us fight like hell. As we always do. And sadly, watch us, and this beautiful city of ours, ultimately lose."

Others were more amenable to the project, pointing to the city's lack of housing.

Dennis Golin, 32, has lived in Washington Heights his whole life. He met his wife when

they both attended preschool at the Fort Tryon Jewish Center, which was formerly housed on the site.


"I would have loved for it to be restored as a community center, but constructing housing would be a far better use for that currently decrepit patch of land," Golin said.

The Fort Washington Avenue portion of the property is currently covered in scaffolding adorned with graffiti and missing dog posters; the Overlook Terrace section is fenced off and strewn with garbage, the remnants of the old synagogue teetering above the rocky yard.


The last attempt to build on the site proved disastrous: construction began in 2007 but ran into financial and logistical troubles and halted during the Great Recession, leaving the synagogue unusable. The project was subsequently foreclosed on.

Gabi Porter, 49, has lived in the neighborhood since 1995 and knows how tough working on the site has been in the past.

"My guess is, after they've spent a fortune trying to get the project going, and disturbed everyone and everything around them, they will ultimately find that they severely underestimated the cost of the project," she said of the plans. "It's ugly, but neighborhoods change and evolve."

NYPD'S BOSS TAKES

Blasted for giving deputy chief a pass after he pulled woman's hair

NYPD Commissioner Edward Caban declined to discipline a high-ranking deputy chief accused of pulling a female protester's hair and shoving her face into the ground in downtown Manhattan in 2020, records show.

Caban's decision came in October in the case of Deputy Chief Gerard Dowling of the NYPD's Special Operations Bureau. Caban's decision was included near the bottom of an oversight report made public last week by the Civilian Complaint Review Board.

Caban elected to remove Dowling's case from CCRB jurisdiction and decide on his own whether to discipline him. It was one of 11 cases Caban "retained" in the last three months of 2023.

Under a 2012 memorandum of understanding between the Police Department and the Civilian Complaint Review Board, police commissioners are allowed to retain cases if submitting them to CCRB examination would be "detrimental" to the NYPD's disciplinary process, or if the officer has no disciplinary history or prior substantiated complaints.

Of the 11 cases Caban retained late in 2023, he issued no discipline in four and minor discipline ranging from training to one lost vacation day in the other seven.

Advocates for police accountability scored Caban's decision in the Dowling case.

"We long have objected to the NYPD's authority to unilaterally close cases where the CCRB has found misconduct, and this case perfectly illustrates that concern," said Christopher Dunn, legal director of the New York Civil Liberties Union.

"When disciplinary cases of high-level officers simply disappear, that destroys the notion of police accountability," Dunn said.

Dowling was cleared of punishment in the case, which began with a protest June 2, 2020, outside 17 Battery Place in the Financial District, across from Battery Park.

NYPD officers and supervisors including Dowling, Inspector James McGeown and Capt. Ronald Ramos tried to disperse the group with kicks and baton strikes, the CCRB found. The encounter generated a series of civilian complaints.

When a woman tried to intervene in the melee, Dowling grabbed her hair by the braid and with two other officers pulled her down, according the CCRB's findings and a video of the incident.

The woman "landed facedown on the ground," the CCRB findings say. Other officers placed flex cuffs on her wrist, the findings show.

In an interview with CCRB after he viewed the video, Dowling acknowledged he had grabbed the woman's hair but said it was unintentional.

The CCRB substantiated the two improper use of force allegations against

Dowling. "Substantiated" means the CCRB found "sufficient credible evidence to believe that the subject officer committed the alleged act without legal justification."

Deputy Chief Anthony Marino, an aide to Caban, wrote CCRB Director Jonathan Darche on Oct. 31 that the force Dowling used in the situation was "reasonable and necessary to overcome resistance to arrest."

Marino noted that Dowling has never been disciplined in 28 years on the job. "The police commissioner intends to take no disciplinary action against [Dowling]," Marino wrote.

Darche replied Nov. 9 arguing the

CCRB should be allowed to pursue charges against Dowling.

"[The woman] was in custody, on the ground surrounded by officers, and posed no physical threat to the officers nor was she a threat to escape custody," he wrote. "Dowling was not justified in using force against her and should be held accountable

for this misconduct."

Marino was unmoved in his reply Nov. 16, repeating that Dowling would not be disciplined for the incident.

Dowling was one of two dozen police supervisors named as defendants in a landmark class action lawsuit filed by the New York Civil Liberties Union and the Legal Aid Society over the NYPD's handling of the 2020 George Floyd protests. The city settled the case in July for \$13.6 million.

Dowling was also named as a defendant in at least five other civil rights lawsuits since 2019 related to actions during protests. The city settled three of those lawsuits for a total of \$276,501, records show.

In one of those settled cases, Alyssa Sukhana named Dowling in her 2021 suit over a May 25, 2020, Bronx protest where people were "kettled," or violently hemmed in, by hundreds of cops. Dowling, the lawsuit alleged, had a key role in planning the police response to the protest. The lawsuit settled for \$78,500, records show.



Christophe Bensmaine named Dowling in his lawsuit over a May 30, 2020, protest in Times Square as a commander of cops who injured him during the event. The city settled that case for \$167,500.

In the third settled case, Christina Gavin named Dowling in her 2020 lawsuit as one of the cops who grabbed her and kicked her legs out from under her during a protest on 125th St. in Harlem on Nov 22, 2019. She alleged Dowling made false statements in the case. That case settled for \$30,501.

Records show Dowling has been named in 14 CCRB complaints, including seven involving use of force. The only two cases substantiated involved the June 2, 2020, incident.

Dowling joined the NYPD in 1995. He was promoted from inspector to deputy chief by then-Commissioner Dermot Shea in October 2021 after those lawsuits had been filed.

He was promoted to deputy chief in June 2022 under then-Commissioner Keechant Sewell.

The CCRB has objected to the practice of letting a police commissioner retain some disciplinary cases.

"The CCRB stands by all its disciplinary recommendations and believes that due process is best served by the disciplinary process," said CCRB spokeswoman Clio Calvo-Platero.

"When the commissioner retains a case, we lay out the facts and explain the board's reasoning as clearly as possible. Under the current disciplinary system, this is all that the CCRB can do in these matters."

As the No. 2 in Special Operations to Chief Wilson Aramboles, Dowling helps oversee the emergency services, aviation, harbor, and mounted units and the Strategic Response Group, which responds to large-scale events.

On Monday, the CCRB issued its annual report for 2023, which showed that 5,550 complaints were filed in the year, a 50% jump over 2022 and the highest total in a decade. Complaints containing an allegation of an improper stop-and-frisk rose to 940 from 522, an 80% spike.



So you wanted snow? OK, now you've got it, for the second time in a week

After nearly two years without any major snowfall, New Yorkers for the second time in a week woke up to a wintry-white scene Saturday.

The precipitation began overnight Friday, coating Central Park with more than 2 inches of snow by 7 a.m., the National Weather Service said. It continued into Saturday morning, with a few flurries still falling into the early afternoon.

The bands of snow from there pushed away from the city and further east, along the South Shore of Long Island, where residents faced threats of snow squalls early Saturday evening.

According to the National Weather Service, snow squalls are "quick intense bursts of snow accompanied by strong gusty winds." While squalls are short-lived, they come on quick, meaning that conditions can deteriorate rapidly.

Ahead of the weekend snowfall, the weather service issued a winter weather advisory for all of New England, New Jersey, southern Westchester County and Long Island an well as New York City. It urged residents to use caution while



driving and to keep an eye out for slippery sidewalks before the notice expired about 10 a.m. on Saturday.

"A huge THANK YOU to everyone who heeded the Travel Advisory and kept our city safe, and to the crews who worked tirelessly through the night and this morning," the NYC Emergency Management said in a post to X.

Temperatures hovered low-to-mid 30s throughout the day Saturday, before plummeting overnight and freezing over the snow-slicked sidewalks.

Temperatures with windchills in the upper teens were forecast for Sunday morning, but things are slated to warm up slightly as the week progresses.

Snow from Tuesday's nor'easter didn't even have a chance to fully melt before the latest round of winter weather.

The storm earlier in the week, which came after a weekend of balmy, springlike weather, hit the Big Apple with nearly 4 inches of snow. The snowfall in the city Saturday was part of a bigger storm sweeping across the East Coast, which tracked a bit more south than the one that struck earlier in the week.

The fast-moving weather event dumped a ton of snow on Virginia, West Virginia, Maryland and southern Pennsylvania, where a winter storm warning was issued late Friday through Saturday morning, according to the National Weather Service. In parts of Maryland and West Virginia, up to 10 inches of snow were in the forecast, with snowfall rates of up to 2 inches an hour at times, the agency said.

In Philadelphia, residents could see as much as 6 inches of snow, while D.C. was slated to get between 2 and 5 inches.

Parts of New Jersey were walloped by winter weather, with as much as a foot of snow blanketing central parts of the Garden State

The weather service warned of snow-covered roads and visibility as low as a half mile to 1 mile, emphasizing the conditions could be dangerous for those traveling.

After months of "Saturday Night Live" skits, late-night monologue jokes and a

scathing Justice Department report about the president's reported memory loss, Biden came out swinging.

He pounded Putin for silencing his opposition, he lashed into lawmakers for taking a recess without voting on a Ukraine aid package, and he tore into former President Donald Trump for threatening to sic

Russia on delinquent NATO members.

"All of us should reject the dangerous statements made by the previous president that invited Russia to invade our NATO allies if they weren't 'paying up.' He said, if an ally did not

pay their dues, he'd encourage Russia to, quote, 'Do whatever the hell they want,' "Biden said.

"This is an outrageous thing for a president to say. I can't fathom, can't fathom – from Truman on, they're all rolling in their graves hearing this. As long as I'm president, America stands by our sacred commitment to our NATO allies, as they have stood by their commitments to us repeatedly."

Biden followed up the remarks with a timely campaign attack ad calling Trump's NATO comments "traitorous."

Biden still has his good days, and this was clearly one of them.

And whether or not he'll have enough of them to sustain the country over the next four years is debatable.

But this, as it usually is, is less about what Biden has left in the tank than it is about the match that Trump would light under it.

Again.

We've seen this show before, and we didn't like the ending the first time.

Only this time, Trump is giving us a

one, and day one only.

He said he would sic Russia on loyal NATO allies.

Why wouldn't we believe him?

"No president has ever said anything like it," the narrator in Biden's new ad says. "It's shameful. It's weak. It's dangerous. It's un-American."

Biden beat Trump once before. But that

is no guarantee that Biden will beat him again.

So, now, the Democrats are playing the dangerous game of relying on the courts to do what they may not be able to do at the ballot box.

Don't bet on it. The U.S. Supreme Court seems poised to reject efforts to kick Trump off the ballot.

Dozens of lawsuits have been filed nationally to disqualify Trump under Section 3 of the 14th Amendment, which was designed to keep former Confederates from returning to government after the Civil War.

It bars from office anyone who swore an oath to "support" the Constitution and then "engaged in insurrection or rebellion" against it.

Does Jan. 6 ring a bell?


Trump's lawyers argue that efforts to keep him off the ballot "threaten to disenfranchise tens of millions of American voters."

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

Adams' snow day hokey pokey is slippery & gross

fter a long snow drought, New Yorkers on Tuesday got a reminder about how quickly the fresh white stuff becomes slippery and gross — and how quickly grand political rhetoric becomes slippery and gross, too.

Every part of the public school's slushy "remote learning" debacle was an indictment of the shrinking system and a mildly traumatic flashback for parents, kids and school staff to the lost pandemic year.

"We feel really good about this," Schools Chancellor David Banks said on Monday. "It's one of the good things that, in fact, emerged from the pandemic, was our preparedness to be ready for moments like this."

But on Tuesday morning, students and teachers logging in were sent to a "Service unavailable" page. Not good!

That apparently counts as a teachable moment for parents, according to Mayor Adams, who hasn't said much about pandemic learning loss generally but was all about it at Monday's press conference with Banks where he declared that "we need to minimize how many days our children are just sitting at home making snowmen"

It takes a special sort of parent to think kids make snowmen while sitting at home. Employing the cranky uncle-knows-best



register he used back in the day to instruct parents to search their kids' dolls for hidden drugs, Adams went on to say that those "not willing to navigate a computer for your child" were "a sad commentary":

"Clicking on, figuring out how to navigate that, using it as a teaching moment on how to get it online and how to get it up, showing our children that difficulties come and we overcome that, that is what it's all about.

"So, you can't tell me that Mommy took me to school with her arthritic knees in a snow day and you are frustrated by [logging] onto a computer. That's not acceptable to me. Our children must learn. They fell behind. We need to catch up. That is what we need to be focusing on."

That's what it's all about, huh?

Parents who spent the pandemic dealing with endless log-ins and system errors before the city's COVID vaccine registration page shut them out on the day in-person school finally resumed aren't going to

dance to that hokey pokey.

Neither are the kids who went sledding in parks on Tuesday after logging in to get checked off as present on what they called "a phony Zoom day."

The real reason the city didn't have a snow day is that it can't lose even one school day without risking a violation of New York State's legal requirement of at least 180 of them.

The city only clears that low bar by counting a couple of teacher training days as school days. In real life, if your kid can't go to school it's not a school day.

As Errol Louis laid out in a classic Daily News column nearly a decade ago, one reason for this mess is the addition of different groups' celebrations as public school holidays — shortchanging all the parents and students citywide who don't observe, say, Yom Kippur or Eid al-Fitr or the Lunar New Year.

It's an expansion that started with the Hebrew High Holidays, back when Jewish women made up a vastly outsized share of public school teachers.

That's ancient history now, yet New York City keeps adding new holidays, most recently Diwali, along with proclamations from politicians about how doing so is a moral triumph for the whole city.

This isn't complicated. Lawmakers

should save the political recognition of different religious and ethnic communities for alternate-side parking suspensions.

Give every public school student a few excused days for family observances. Don't schedule big tests or events on the days of major holidays. Use asynchronous "remote learning" so that kids have a way to catch up on their own time with lessons they miss.

Adams, an inveterate tech booster who took his first paycheck as mayor in cryptocurrency, was mocked during the campaign for fantasizing about how, "By using the new technology of remote learning, you don't need children to be in a school building with a number of teachers. It's just the opposite. You could have one great teacher ... teach three to four hundred students who are struggling in math."

Later, he claimed he'd meant 30 or 40 students even though he'd talked about hundreds on other occasions, and said:

"I fought to end remote learning and put children back in schools. I'm a believer in that."

Amen!

And when the weather doesn't allow for that, have a snow day.

NYC needs housing, not lawsuits

s the City Council mulls a lawsuit to force the Adams administration into compliance with its CityFHEPS housing voucher expansion, the Legal Aid Society beat them to the punch last week.

City Hall has made no bones about the fact that it otherwise has no intention of complying with the misguided law, which among other things makes New Yorkers eligible if they've received a demand letter from a landlord and aren't even in eviction proceedings while also significantly raising income thresholds.

We of course should not set the precedent that a mayoral administration is empowered to simply ignore laws as passed by the City Council, a circumstance that would lead to chaos and rule by arbitrary edict. While this particular law may have been short-sighted and premature, coming into effect as NYC hit a historically low vacancy rate for affordable apartments, it is still a law duly passed by the public's elected representatives over the mayor's veto. If a court has to order the administration to start issuing the vouchers, so be it.

What the court can't do is change the availability of housing. While it is incumbent on City Hall to ensure it has the administrative and bureaucratic resources to comply with its legal obligations, the mayor can't snap his fingers and create this capacity, especially as the city has already been struggling to timely issue benefits for existing applicants.

Piling on thousands of additional beneficiaries will, obviously and unavoidably, set back efforts to get the benefit to the people who more desperately need it. You can think this is a shame or a dereliction, but

s the City Council mulls a lawsuit to force the none of that changes the calculus as it currently exists.

More to the point, a judge certainly can't produce more housing or increase the vacancy rate (or print the extra billions needed for the extra vouchers.) There are several efforts underway at the city and state levels to shift things around, to streamline zoning requirements and incentivize transit-oriented development and restore tax incentives for new construction. These initiatives are crucial, even existential, and they must be pursued with expediency and resolve by lawmakers and advocates.

rior to the fruits of these efforts, though, we're at an emergency level of housing shortage, and it is wrong to pit currently homeless voucher holders against a large pool of new beneficiaries for a minuscule stock of current affordable apartments. As per City Hall, there are already some 10,000 voucher holders who have yet to find housing to actually use their vouchers on. Adding another 10,000 seems like the opposite of a solution.

The Council knew all this before it passed the bill and overrode Mayor Adams' veto, and now what's done is done.

New vouchers are mandated and will be going out, but the Council's supposed pro-housing members shouldn't be surprised now when this fails to fix the city's affordable housing crisis, and they certainly shouldn't take it as a job well done without working in a concerted way to address this crisis.

They began with a potential last step and are working their way backwards, and if they don't reach the first steps soon then they will find that this push is cosmetic at best and counterproductive at worst. Get to it, clock's ticking.

Get your No. 2 pencils ready

he standardized test, badly battered in recent years as universities moved to more holistic admissions models during the COVID pandemic and in the wake of Supreme Court rulings upending race-conscious admissions, isn't down for the count quite yet — and that's a good thing for young people from disadvantaged backgrounds.

This month, Dartmouth became the first Ivy League school to resume requiring students to submit their SAT or ACT score, starting next year, moving away from a test-optional policy that, while well-intentioned, wasn't having the desired effect.

This isn't just about a small cluster of elite private schools that get outsized attention while educating a tiny fraction of Americans. According to the nonprofit FairTest, more than 80% of U.S. colleges are now test-optional or test-free.

The problem is this: Tests, while certainly imperfect measures of academic prowess, are better than most alternatives. They're less subject to highly unlevel playing fields, like grade point average and school quality and course difficulty. They're not profoundly subjective, like measurements of students' grit and creativity and exuberance. They don't innately favor the wealthy and well-connected, as are the points often given to students with enriching service projects or extracurriculars.

Sure, plenty of students can and do prep to boost their SAT or ACT scores, and that preparation often costs money – but standardized tests, which are the same whether you take them in Astoria, Anchorage or Alabama, turn out to be among pretty good predictors of students' success.

Dartmouth changed course after its new president, Sian Beilock, asked some professors to study standardized tests' utility as a criterion in admissions. First, they found that tests more closely correlated with students' college performance than high-school grades, teacher recommendations and essays. Second, and maybe even more important for those who've been leading the anti-test brigades to understand, they found that less-advantaged students often withheld their test scores thinking that doing so would increase their chances of admissions — when in fact their scores would've helped them get into the elite school.

The score on a single test taken on a single day is only one indicator. There are plenty of kids who do a little bit worse on the SAT and ACT who might otherwise be brilliant students. Which is one of the drawbacks with the single-test admissions model for the most selective New York City public high schools.

ut there's a huge distance between saying that admissions shouldn't be based on just one test and saying tests shouldn't be one important factor, measured alongside others. In far too many ways, the college admissions game is rigged to help the wealthy and privileged. A study released last year found that applicants from families in the top 0.1% economically had more than twice the chance of getting accepted to a top-tier university than the average applicant.

The SAT and ACT – and Advanced Placement tests, and International Baccalaureate tests, and other well-established, rigorous measures of what kids have learned and how sharply they think – can give a leg up to disadvantaged kids who might have attended subpar K-12 schools, had turbulent adolescences filled with family and economic obligations, yet still managed to show a spark.

Don't write off the tests, or the kids who use them to demonstrate excellence, vet.

Vision Zero's decade of safer streets

oday, Feb. 18, New York City marks the 10th anniversary of the Vision Zero traffic safety program, which has had a transformative effect on our streets.

From my days chairing the City Council's Transportation Committee, when Vision Zero started, to now leading the New York City Department of Transportation (NYC DOT), I know many New Yorkers take those transformations for granted. But hearing from the families of traffic violence victims who first courageously urged New York to embrace Vision Zero, I know the importance of our efforts.

We know much work is left to do. But on this anniversary, it is worthwhile to first take stock of the incredible progress over the past decade as we took an unprecedented approach to fostering safer and more equitable streets for all New Yorkers.

Inspired by our colleagues in Europe, New York City was the first Vision Zero city in America, as we recognized that our goal should be NO traffic fatalities, and uses a mix of engineering, education, and enforcement measures to get there. Since 2014, Vision Zero has been instrumental in driving down traffic deaths in NYC by more than 10%, with pedestrian fatalities declining a dramatic 37%.

As national trends move in the opposite direction, our efforts here have saved lives, spared families from heartbreak, and made communities stronger through the collective efforts of a range of New Yorkers – from advocates to elected officials and beyond.

Those tangible results also reflect the commitment of Mayor Adams to equity: neighborhoods with the highest percentages of non-white residents actually saw a 16% decrease in overall traffic fatalities during the 10 years of the program; in just the last two years, African-American traffic fatalities have declined 36%.

Vision Zero has worked because it is driven by data. By leveraging detailed information about crashes, we make sure that each day NYC DOT deploys new safety interventions where they are needed most — by raising crosswalks to make intersections safer or adding pedestrian head-start signals, protected bicycle lanes, and much more.

Vision Zero's greatest legacy may in fact lie in dramatic physical changes we made to the streets themselves. With more than 1,200 safety projects completed and more than 200 miles of protected bike lanes installed, New York City's landscape has undergone a remarkable transformation.

Iconic thoroughfares like Queens Blvd. and the Grand Concourse may stand as the best examples, with significant declines in crashes, pedestrian injuries, and deaths. But every neighborhood has seen change, and last year we built a record number of protected bike lanes, prioritizing underserved communities such as the South Bronx and East New York, and to accommodate faster e-mobility devices, we also widened lanes.

Education has also been a cornerstone of Vision Zero's outreach efforts, as NYC DOT has fostered a new level of traffic safety consciousness. From school visits to training sessions for transportation professionals, we sparked culture change around the importance of responsible road behavior.

Finally, enforcement, too, has played a pivotal role in Vision Zero. We deployed hundreds of new speed cameras, and their expansion to 24/7 operation in 2022 led to a significant reduction in overnight speeding, dropping by an average of 30% along corridors with camera enforcement. We focus on speed because it is the key factor between life and death in most traffic crashes: a pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling at 25 mph is half as likely to die as a pedestrian struck at 30 mph.

Looking ahead, New York City's experience should serve as an inspiration for other American cities, especially around pedestrian fatalities — which Vision Zero has helped drive to record lows here. Last year in New York City we had the second-fewest pedestrian fatalities in 114 years of recorded data while across the country, pedestrian deaths reached 40-year highs.

Here in New York, we have now set our sights even higher, with plans to add more space at intersections (called "daylighting") and secure more red-light cameras, which we believe can save even more lives.

Because we have not yet met Vision Zero's ultimate goal, the 10th anniversary is a bittersweet milestone: at my agency, we are making it a reaffirmation of our sober and collective commitment to building a safer, more equitable future. As we reflect on a decade of progress, we will redouble our efforts to make every street safer.

Together, we can continue to work to honor those grieving families who have bravely turned their pain into purpose – and bring the vision of zero traffic fatalities to a reality.

N.Y. GOPers must not repeal Obamacare

ore than a decade after the Affordable Care Act's passage, President Barack Obama's signature achievement is more popular than ever. So is 2024 the year that Republicans finally give up their crusade to repeal the ACA? If former President Donald Trump's recent comments on the matter are any indicator, they're not through with it yet.

This open enrollment period, a record-breaking 21.3 million Americans signed up for health care through the Affordable Care Act, nearly double the number of people enrolled when President Biden took office. As the former Health and Human Services regional director for New York and New Jersey, I'm proud to have supported the agency through historic enrollment rates and educated folks on their health care options.

Today, more people are covered by the ACA than ever before, and the nation's uninsured rate is historically low at 8%. In New York State alone, 3.8 million residents are insured through ACA marketplace coverage.

The numbers speak for themselves: Americans want affordable, high quality health care. Four out of five people who sign up for health insurance through the ACA can find health care coverage for \$10 a month or less. Millions of Americans on Obamacare are saving an average of \$800 a year, giving working class families more breathing room to pay for other necessities like food, gas and rent.

And yet, Trump is doubling down on his pledge to terminate the ACA if he is elected president again. The former president claims that he wants to replace Obamacare with a better alternative, but after many years of threats to repeal it, Trump has yet to produce a viable plan. Meanwhile, New York's Republican delegation is slowly but surely endorsing him one by one for the GOP presidential nomination. It's safe to assume they're in lockstep with his reckless calls to roll back one of the most transformative and life-saving statutes in American history.

The consequences of ACA repeal would be disastrous: in addition to millions of people losing coverage, more than 135 million Americans with pre-existing conditions would lose critical protections, 49 million seniors would have to pay higher costs for prescription drugs, and insurance companies would not be required to cover preventative care, such as vaccinations, contraception, and cancer screenings.

Adult children would no longer be able to stay on their parents' insurance and insurance

companies could impose annual and lifetime limits on coverage.

Trump's call to end the ACA has been met with deafening silence by most of New York's Republican members of Congress. The stakes are incredibly high – given that the state of New York could very well decide which party controls Congress in 2024, it's important for voters to know what New York's GOP representatives, including Mike Lawler, Nick LaLota, Brandon Williams, and Anthony D'Esposito would do if faced with gutting the Affordable Care Act.

Concerningly, New York Republicans have long supported ACA repeal, voting repeatedly to gut ACA protections, cut back access to Medicaid, and raise prescription drug costs for conicre

When I look back on my tenure as the HHS regional director, I'm proud of the cost-saving, common sense health care reforms we achieved for Americans. As Republicans in Washington fight to block progress and weaken health care protections for Americans, Democrats expanded on the success of the ACA with the passage of the Inflation Reduction Act, which makes coverage more affordable for people and lowers drug costs for seniors, including a \$35 a month cap on insulin and no-cost vaccines.

I am deeply concerned about the New York GOP's enabling of Trump's extreme proposals, especially as New York battles an affordability crisis. As the cost of living skyrockets across our state, ACA coverage gives people peace of mind knowing they won't go bankrupt over an injury or illness. It also means people can actually go to the doctor if they do get sick, improving health outcomes.

Thanks to the ACA, no one has to worry that their insurance company will discriminate against them over a pre-existing condition or charge them more basic care.

The ACA is under threat, and we must hold our lawmakers accountable. If the extreme Republicans in Congress get their way, millions of families would face skyrocketing health care costs or lose their health care altogether. We must push them to protect access to health care, not rip it away from New Yorkers who need it most

NYC's frontline doctors need your help

n 2020 we as a nation faced the most difficult of times. We battled a 1-in-a-100-year pandemic as countries closed off borders, travel was restricted and much of the world wore face masks to protect themselves and loved ones from infection. More than a million Americans perished and we, the dedicated doctors, fought for your and our own survival.

Each day, more than a dozen patients would succumb to the virus within our hospital walls at Elmhurst Hospital. Ours mirrored the reality of virtually every public hospital in New York. In an attempt to mitigate the havoc wrought by this new disease, overworked physicians and nurses worked round the clock treating hundreds of patients despite the incredible danger it posed to their own well-being.

These numbers reflect the magnitude of the battle waged by health care professionals at Elmhurst and all of the city's other public hospitals. A battle that, at times, felt apocalyptic.

As health care professionals, we witnessed the chaos within the emergency rooms – the stretchers running out, freezer trucks being used to store bodies as morgues overflowed, chairs doubling as makeshift accommodations, and the overwhelming demand for critical care. The intensive care units intended for the most critical cases and sickest patients, were inundated beyond capacity, underscoring the immense strain placed upon our health care workforce.

Before the pandemic, the city's hospital system grappled with significant physician staffing challenges. However, the pandemic's aftermath intensified this pre-existing problem, pushing recruitment and retention of doctors to the brink of impossibility. The absence of sufficient staffing jeopardizes patient care, regardless of the doctors' expertise, leaving them unable to deliver the necessary and deserved care. In such stressful conditions, doctors are more prone to experiencing burnout, hindering their ability to perform optimally.

We have substantial vacancies in many, if not most, public hospital departments across the Health + Hospitals system. The scarcity of physicians within the system has exacerbated the workload for those already in service, compelling them to extend their work hours beyond reasonable limits. This prolonged strain on the existing workforce has led to an alarming rise in cases of burnout among health care professionals.

The inability to effectively recruit and retain physicians has not only hampered the delivery of quality care but has also taken a toll on the well-being of those tirelessly working to uphold

the health care infrastructure. In light of these pressing challenges, we are seeking out your support in addressing the urgent staffing needs within our health care system.

The physicians who work in the facilities that make up New York City's Health + Hospitals are at a disadvantage relative to those who work in facilities owned by private entities. Compared to our counterparts in privately owned facilities, physicians within the city hospitals are notably under-resourced, receiving significantly lower compensation while grappling with perpetually short-staffed environments.

Despite these challenges, we remain steadfast in our commitment to providing quality care to all, irrespective of background, economic status, immigration status, or identity. Our physicians serve as beacons of compassion and dedication, often sacrificing personal time and familial obligations for the betterment of their patients. Their unwavering dedication to serving the most vulnerable members of society underscores their selflessness and resilience in the face of adversity, embodying the true spirit of health care service

However, we are fortunate to be part of a union that understands our needs as physicians. The Doctors Council SEIU aims to create meaningful change that not only enhances the professional satisfaction and quality of life for our physicians but also bolsters the overall resilience and effectiveness of the public health care sector. By championing fair pay and dignified working conditions, the union seeks to fortify the foundation upon which the Health + Hospitals system rests, ensuring its capacity to continue serving the diverse health care needs of New York City's residents.

We are fighting for a fair contract and are seeking the public's support during our negotiations. I am proud to be part of this coalition of doctors in public service. Help us continue to have the ability to serve the communities we love. Call or email your City Council member or the mayor. Tell them the city's doctors who service us deserve a fair contract that can help maintain the health care system.

The city hospitals need to be fully staffed. They need to recruit and retain the doctors who serve those most in need – those who have nowhere else to go for their health care needs.

Improve your credit score to borrow at better rates

f you intend to buy a new home, or if you intend to take out a loan in the near future for any other reason, you obviously want to have the best credit rating in order to get the lowest interest possible.

Here are some ways for you to improve your credit score.

- Pay your bills on time. Whenever you pay a bill late, it can have a negative impact on your credit score. Use automatic monthly payments with reliable servicers.
- Pay your credit card bill in full each month rather than carry a balance.
- Keep your credit utilization below 30% of your credit limit. One way to do this is to ask some of your creditors to increase your credit limit.
- Don't apply for too many new accounts. Even if you apply for a new account and are not approved, it can have a negative impact on your credit score.
 - Review your credit report, and

dispute any errors. There are three credit reporting agencies, Equifax, TransUnion and Experian. At no cost, once a year, you can request a credit report from these companies. If there are any errors in the report that have a negative impact on your credit rating, ask for a correction to be made as soon as possible.

• If your credit score is too low to obtain a new traditional credit card, you can obtain a secured credit card. With this type of credit card, a credit limit will be established, and you will have to prepay this amount in advance. However, once you demonstrate that you can use this account responsibly, you should be able to establish new traditional credit cards.

If you are buying a new home, you obviously want to obtain the lowest interest rate. Because inflation is under better control now, the Federal Reserve is likely to reduce interest rates in 2024. The average 30-year fixed rate mortgage has dropped to approximately 6.7% at the end of January according to Freddie Mac. As a result, obtaining a 6% rate may be possible

in the near future if you have established a good credit rating.

If you are able to increase your credit score and obtain the lowest interest rate, it will reduce the lifetime cost by thousands of dollars

For example, according to Bankrate, if you have a credit score of 760 or above, it is conceivable that you could obtain a mortgage with a 6.33% rate now. Comparing that rate with a mortgage of 6.95%, which might be the best rate available with a lower credit score, the difference in payments for a \$300,000 mortgage for a 30-year term would be over \$44,000.

Another way to lower your interest cost is to use "mortgage points." Each point represents 1% of the loan amount; you can pay points upfront to the lender. One point on a \$200,000 loan would cost \$2,000. Each point lowers the interest rate by a quarter of a percentage point for the life of the loan.

If you are planning to refinance the mortgage in a short time frame, paying points upfront is less desirable.

Generally, you can obtain the best

interest rate on a mortgage from a financial institution where you maintain several other accounts, such as investment accounts, savings accounts or checking accounts.

However, you have to be careful to understand the financial institution's requirements in order to obtain a lower interest rate. If there is a requirement to maintain a very large account minimum in order to receive a lower mortgage rate, it may not be worthwhile.

For example, if the financial institution is offering a lower rate only if you have them manage a large investment portfolio, I would be hesitant to agree to that condition.

Don't assume that your bank is offering the best mortgage rate. It's best to investigate multiple financial institutions. However, it would be best to obtain the best rate without having to commit to a large account balance for accounts you may not want to maintain.

Single? No close relatives? You should plan for care late in life

or many retirees, plans for their own elder care often include relying on family for some assistance. But how can singles with no close relatives plan for their own care late in life?

The short answer is that they should be doing much the same things as people who have families — except that their situation can be more complicated, so they may have to take extra steps.

"Estate planning is fundamentally important for singles," says Erin Smith, director of estate planning for Edelman Financial Engines.

In particular, you need to draft a durable power of attorney naming someone as "attorney-in-fact" to make financial decisions on your behalf should you become incapacitated, and you should appoint a health care proxy to handle medical decisions.

If you die without a will, state law determines how your assets will be distributed.

But, says Smith, "no state has a statutory list of people to make financial decisions for you."

Although adult children often fill this role, it's fine to cast a wider net. "I don't necessarily think of 'family' as blood relatives," says Suzanne Blankenship, author of "How to Take Care of Old People Without Losing Your Marbles."

"I define 'family' as people who make me feel at home – someone like a trusted friend or colleague." Even more important is that your representative be both financially savvy and trustworthy.

If you don't know anyone who fills the bill, you can always hire a

professional, such as an estate-planning attorney, a trust company or, in certain states, someone who has been licensed as a "professional fiduciary."

Virginia Wilkins, who is 79 and has always been single, made her first estate plan in 1974 when she bought her first house, and she has been updating it ever since. "Tve used many different professionals, including attorneys, accountants and financial planners," Wilkins says. Because we tend to select someone from our own generation, says Wilkins, "as we grow older, so do they, and they could retire or die before we do."

As a result, one of the first questions she asks is about continuity: "What provisions have they made should they die or become incapacitated?"

The caveat about defaulting to

someone from your own age group applies to your attorney-in-fact as well as your health care proxy. In each case, Smith recommends having a second or third choice from a younger generation as a backup.

And just as you need someone with financial savvy to handle your finances, look for someone with a health care background to make medical decisions, or at least someone who stays calm under pressure.

An estate plan can also deal with issues that are of special concern to singles, such as naming a guardian for pets.

Smith notes that some states impose their own estate taxes, which can kick in on estates that exceed as little as \$1 million. Married couples can delay estate taxes till the death of the surviving spouse, but "singles need to plan for their own tax mitigation," says Smith.

Unhappily hybrid Return-to-office debate may be settling down in a way that pleases no one

fter years of flip-flopping on remote and in-person work policies, most knowledge workers and employers seem to have reached a hybrid compromise, but questions remain about the truce lasting.

While not every worker wants to work from home and not every employer is demanding a return to the office, studies since the pandemic have consistently shown a clear divide between the two groups

One recent report from Ringover, for example, found that two-thirds of workers would accept a lower salary for a remote role and nearly 80% are worried about a return-to-office mandate. The study also found that in-office days have steadily increased in America, from an average of 1.1 a week in 2021 to 3.4 last year.

Employers, meanwhile, largely have sought to bring workers back into the office. In 2021, many of the biggest tech companies began rolling out the first iteration of their RTO policies, only to pivot in the face of employee backlash and new COVID variants.


Amazon, for example, announced a full return to office in 2021, then switched to a policy that would allow team leaders to set the standard, only to later switch to a strict three-day in-office requirement, which was met by employee petitions and walkouts. In November, CEO Andy Jassy announced greater enforcement measures and threatened the jobs of those who didn't comply.

Similar tussles have broken out at workplaces across the country and around the world as employers and employees jostle over work arrangements. After years of fighting, however, much of the workforce appears to be settling into a more standard hybrid schedule that neither side seems entirely satisfied with - but both may be willing to accept.

A THREE-DAY COMPROMISE

According to a recent study conducted by global corporate real estate firm Jones Lang LaSalle, 90% of Fortune 100 employees are either hybrid or fully on site, with an overall average of three days of weekly office attendance.

"2023 was really the year of many companies establishing their policies that had been holdouts," said Jones Lang LaSalle's research manager Jacob Rowden, the study's author. "Moving into 2024, we're going to see a lot less companies having a wholesale shift in their policies,



and more companies focusing on enforcement and adoption of the policies that they've already rolled

Rowden explains that after three years of remote and hybrid work experiments, many employers are ready to move past the workplace-flexibility question and start making long-term plans based on a consistent policy.

"I'm sure we will still see incremental movements here and there, but it seems like most of the progress that we've made in the last year has gotten us close to an equilibrium," he says. "You're starting to see more of a clustering of policies according to industry, so now it's the case that if you look at any company, and you look at a majority of their competitors and peers, they will all have very similar policies."

EMPLOYERS ARE READY TO MOVE ON

Although employers and employees seem ready to compromise on a three-day in-office average, neither side seems entirely satisfied.

A resumebuilder.com survey

from late 2023, for example, found that 9 in 10 employers will enforce an RTO mandate by the end of 2024. Furthermore, while remote roles have become less common, interest remains strong.

According to a study conducted by LinkedIn, remote jobs make up less than a tenth of positions advertised on the platform, yet they receive 46% of the applications – about five times more than the average.

"Based on some survey evidence we've seen in the broader public, employers might be ready to move on to other problems, whereas for workers, having that flexibility might be their primary problem," LinkedIn senior economist Kory Kantenga says. "Having a backup if your babysitter cancels, being able to take care of sick or elderly parents. These are problems people deal with every day that being able to work flexibly helps, and they can't deprioritize them because there's another problem shareholders want to solve."

Kantenga adds that labor market dynamics will largely dictate which side has more power at the negotiating table, and despite a slight pullback last year, the market is again trending in employees' favor.

"There have been a lot of RTO mandates that have come out, but they haven't actually worked - and we haven't seen employers firing workers en masse – so there's a sense of revealed preference there," he says. "Taking a longer view, we have a population that is shrinking, and that means that labor supply is going to be constrained, so at some point the balance of power will tip toward workers."

MOST EMPLOYERS DON'T EMBRACE FLEXIBILITY

In the shorter term, however, it appears that most office workers are willing to settle for a hybrid compromise, even if it's not their ideal option. According to a survey conducted by FlexJobs, about 46% say hybrid is their top choice, 51% would prefer to be fully remote, and just 3% want to be in the office full time.

"There's a lot of leveling off that has happened in the last year regarding the average organization doing two to three days in the

office," says FlexJobs founder and CEO Sara Sutton. "I think the debates are still happening, the pendulum is still swinging, and I think we're kind of vulnerable because there's been so many outside forces that have pushed remote. I don't think it's solid yet."

Sutton explains that when it comes to setting flexibility policies, most employers feel like their hand has been forced, first by the pandemic, then by internal pressure from employees, but most haven't fully bought in to the concept.

As such, she fears that instead of a sudden pivot, many have resigned to enforcing a full return to office in gradual steps, which may explain the current state of affairs and may foreshadow more turmoil to come.

"Hybrid is where people are, but they're not comfortable there – the majority of organizations still aren't comfortable there which is why it still feels volatile," she says. "Until that part shifts, and the majority of companies choose hybrid as the best-case scenario ... I will have a hard time believing it's actually been accepted?

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DREAMSTIME

Don't sabotage your success after promotion

t's an amazing feeling to get a promotion. You've been recognized for your results and ability to perform at a high level. You're excited, and perhaps a little bit nervous, and want to prove yourself in your new role.

In this swirl of emotions, it's tempting to double down on what you've already been doing that got you to this point. But as a time management coach, I've seen that using the same time management strategies in your new position as you've used in your previous one can actually sabotage your success.

Here are the four time management strategies to use when you get a promotion to help you succeed at this higher level.

SHIFT YOUR PRIORITIES

When you receive a promotion, you typically take on a broader scope of responsibility. To do well in this larger role, you'll likely need to spend less time on — or sometimes no time at all — on what you were doing in the past. Even though this makes sense intellectually, emotionally you can be tempted to revert to doing the work you used to do or to constantly check in and "help" the people who are still doing those activities.

The reason this happens is that you

feel more comfortable in areas where you have years of experience. And your new role may include tasks you don't feel as confident in – and some tasks where you may have no idea what you're doing.

To fight this temptation, step back and think about what matters most in your current role. What are your annual goals? How will you be evaluated? What's really your responsibility?

Then focus on learning how to do this new work. If you're doing your direct reports' jobs, no one is doing yours.

DELEGATE MORE

When you're a top performer, it's easy to fall into the mindset that "I can do this better than anyone else, so I should just do it myself."

Although it may be true that you could complete a task at a higher level than others, that might not actually be in your best interest after a promotion. You can't do what you did in the past to the same level of detail and handle more.

You not only need to be clear about your new priorities and resist the urge to do the job you used to do, but you likely also need to learn to delegate some responsibilities that are part of your new role.

For example, perhaps you're promoted to sales manager, and you're now responsible for leading other salespeople in addition to personally working on a few large accounts. With this promotion, you may now have some administrative support as well as some junior salespeople under you. Because you're taking on the new management responsibilities, you could release time by delegating items like:

- Background prep on prospects.
- Coordinating meeting times.
- Updating the customer relationship management system after a meeting.
 Filling out expense reports.

These tasks likely still relate to the large accounts you're managing but aren't items that need to be on your to-do list. By using your team, you can focus on the highest leverage activities that lead to more sales.

SET MORE BOUNDARIES

Another counterintuitive shift that you need to make when you get promoted is to set more boundaries. It can be tempting to do the opposite and feel like you need to fling your door wide open to be available to staff. But if you're in more meetings and have more responsibility, you actually have less flexibility for ad hoc chats.

At minimum, I recommend blocking some hours each week to do your own focused work. That might look like no meetings before 10 a.m. (except in emergency) or blocking out Tuesday and Thursday afternoons for two hours at a time.

If you protect time for yourself, you'll be more present and helpful and available for your team. If you don't give yourself any time to get your own work done, you can end up frustrated, resentful and desperately trying to catch up on your tasks after everyone else has logged off for the night.

MANAGE YOUR INBOXES

When you get more messages, you need to focus more on managing your inboxes instead of letting your inboxes manage you. That means that you'll want to have a clear sense of your top priorities for the day and not let yourself get derailed by less important items that might pop into your inboxes.

If something comes in that's not your top priority but will take a significant amount of time, you can either delegate it or reply to the message letting the person know that you received their message and will get to the item soon.

Then you can plan in time to get the task done when it works for you. You can't make everyone happy all at once, so you need to reply to the most important messages and triage the rest.

A promotion is an amazing opportunity to up-level your influence and skills. When you manage your time correctly, you can make sure that you continue to succeed and set yourself up for the next opportunity.

Lying George sues Jimmy Kimmel over vids for show

Ousted Rep. George Santos has filed a lawsuit against Jimmy Kimmel, alleging the funnyman fooled him into making personalized videos via the Cameo app, which he then used as content for his eponymous late-night talk show.

The suit, filed Saturday in Manhattan Federal Court, was sparked by a segment on "Jimmy Kimmel Live!" called "Will Santos Say It?"

Back in December, Kimmel revealed to his audience that Santos – who had just been expelled from Congress over alleged fraud

and campaign finance violations – found a new gig on Cameo, a platform that allows celebrities and other high-profile figures to charge fans for customized videos.

According to Santos' suit, obtained by the Daily News, Kimmel (photo left) and his team created "phony names and narratives" and then submitted at least 14 requests for clips through the app. It further claims the show's staff selected "personal use licenses for all the Cameo videos with the intention to violate such licenses by broadcasting and commercially exploiting the Cameo videos on national television."

In a couple of clips aired during the segment, Santos (photo right) congratulated a fake fan for winning a meat-eating contest and



lauded another for cloning her dog, according to the suit.

"Could you imagine if I get sued by George Santos for a fraud? I mean, how good would that be? It would be like a dream



come true," Kimmel said during his Dec. 11 show, according to the suit. "Since I started buying his videos, his rates went way up to \$500 a piece. He should be thanking me for buying these videos."

The following day, Santos sent Kimmel a cease-and-desist letter.

"Kimmel admitted to committing copyright infringement and fraud against George in the name of 'comedy' and then asked us to sue him, all on national television. So we did," his attorney Andrew Mancilla said in a statement to the Daily News.

Santos is suing Kimmel, ABC and Disney for copyright infringement, fraud, breach of contract and unjust enrichment. He's seeking \$150,000 in statutory damages for each alleged infringement, for a total of \$750,000 over five videos.

He has also demanded the videos be removed from YouTube and TikTok accounts associated with the show.

Mother of three and a man found shot to death in B'klyn apartment

A mother of three and a man neighbors believed to be her boyfriend were found dead of gunshot wounds in a Brooklyn apartment, police said Saturday.

Detectives are looking into the possibility that the man found dead in the Cypress Hills building killed the woman and then himself, a police source with knowledge of the case said.

Cops responding to a report of a crime in progress found a 43-year-old woman and a 40-year-old man unconscious inside an apartment on Logan St. near Etna St. about 4:45 p.m. Friday.

Both victims had been shot in the head and were declared died at the scene. A firearm was found near the man's body, police said

Neighbors said the dead woman, who was originally from the Dominican Republic, lived with her young daughter and two sons

"She was a really nice lady. She's calm and stays to herself," said a neighbor who gave his name as Xavier.

"She would host karaoke parties. She

would have family over," Xavier said.

Another neighbor, Grace Hernandez, 58, said she last saw the woman three Saturdays ago. "She opened the door and she kissed her daughter goodbye when the father came to pick her up," Hernandez

The building super, Santos Araujo, said he noticed a turn in the woman's behavior when she began dating a man he described as "antisocial" a few months back.

"She was a happy lady. Very happy. She liked music," said Araujo.

"After she met this guy she changed a lot. She used to play music a lot. After December we noticed she doesn't play music. It's weird"

The victims' names were not immediately disclosed Saturday as cops worked to notify family members.

"It's very sad because we are all like family in this building," Araujo said.

Last month, Jason Jackson, 35, shot his girlfriend Olga Kirshenbaum dead and then himself in their Park Slope apartment, cops said.

Both victims had been shot in the head, cops said.

A handgun was found next to Jackson's body, leading police to believe that he shot Kirshenbaum, then took his own life.

Suffolk officer is stabbed, cops fatally shoot suspect

Suffolk police fatally shot a Bay Shore man who stabbed an officer responding to a domestic violence call Saturday, officials said.

Police responded to the home on Udall Road in Bay Shore about 9:10 a.m. after a woman called and "stated that her husband was acting violent," said Acting Suffolk County Police Commissioner Robert Waring.

As officers opened a screen door at the home's front entrance, Taiquell Woodson, 33, emerged with a large knife and lunged at one of the officers, Waring said.

"The officer retreated and fell into the snow in the front yard," Waring said.

"Woodson jumped on top of him with the knife and he starts stabbing the officer, clearly attempting to kill him."

The officer's bullet-resistant vest saved him from being stabbed in the chest, officials said

Another officer tried to use his Taser on Woodson, but was unsuccessful.

A third officer at the scene "fired his service weapon, striking Woodson and stopping the attack," Waring said.

"This incident occurred in about five seconds," the police commissioner said. "I want to be clear: This was a justified shooting."

Officers gave Woodson CPR at the scene, and an ambulance rushed him to South Shore University Hospital, where he was pronounced dead.

The stabbed officer was taken to Stony Brook University Hospital, where he was treated for wounds to his hands, arms and face

The injuries are not life-threatening, but the officer may suffer nerve damage to his hand, said James Vosswinkel, a Stony Brook trauma

Woodson's wife and 1-year-old child remained in the home and were uninjured in the incident.

The identity of the officer was not made public Saturday.

Waring said the officer has been with the Suffolk County Police Department for a year and a half.

There is body cam video of the incident, but it will not be released "at this time," Waring said.

The shooting will be investigated by the state attorney general's office.

Woodson's criminal history includes an arrest for a robbery in Riverhead, L.I., in October, Waring said.

Scooter driver dies in Bx. hit-run; motorist nabbed

A 35-year-old man on a two-wheeled gas-powered scooter died in a Bronx hit-and-run crash — and the driver involved ended up under arrest, police said Saturday.

William Cruz was riding his scooter south on Park Ave. in Belmont about 7:40 p.m. on Friday when he collided with a black sedan heading east

on E. 183rd St., cops said.

EMS rushed Cruz to St. Barnabas Hospital, but he couldn't be saved. Cruz lived in Washington Heights.


The operator of the sedan, Emilio Galvan, 25, fled the scene and later ditched his car, cops said.

Cops said they figured out where the car was ditched, and waited for Galvan to retrieve it.

When he returned to pick up the car a aboutnoon Saturday, he was placed under arrest, police said.

Police charged Galvan, who lives in Norwood, the Bronx, with leaving the scene of an accident and operating a motor vehicle without insurance.

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
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These roll-ups offer everything you love about classic layered lasagna, only they are much easier. TNS

Everyone will want seconds

an Italian American family and quickly realized that every tender memory involved a loud, full table and plates of cheesy lasagna. I make the family's heirloom recipe for special occasions, but for those nights in between, I tend to tinker with the recipe.

So far, my favorite iteration is lasagna roll-ups. This classic dinner includes the same tender sheets of pasta, meaty marinara sauce and creamy ricotta filling. But it's more fun to make and much easier to serve because every person gets their own saucy spiral.

KEY INGREDIENTS

Marinara sauce: Choose a good-quality store-bought sauce or make marinara from scratch.

Mozzarella cheese: Buy pre-shredded or shred your own mozzarella cheese. Look for the blocks of low-moisture mozzarella, not the rounds of fresh mozzarella for this recipe.

Parmesan cheese: The salty, funky flavor of Parmesan cheese can't be beat. Add half of the grated Parmesan cheese to the ricotta filling and save the rest for topping the roll-ups.

Ricotta cheese: Whole-milk ricotta cheese has a creamy texture. Avoid lower-fat options, which have a rubbery consistency.

Egg: A single egg adds richness to the

ricotta cheese filling and helps give it some structure, so that the cheese doesn't slide out of the pasta spirals.

Lasagna noodles: This recipe was developed with regular dried lasagna noodles, not no-boil.

Onion and garlic: Sauteed onion and garlic is the secret to adding homemade flavor to store-bought marinara sauce.

Ground beef: Use lean ground beef so you don't have to drain off excess fat. Ground turkey (not ground turkey breast) can be substituted.

TIPS FOR MAKING ROLL-UPS

Stack noodles between parchment paper: Boiled lasagna noodles really want to stick together once they are drained. Arrange the noodles so they are ready to roll by filling a rimmed baking sheet with a single layer of noodles. Top with parchment paper, add another layer of lasagna noodles and repeat.

Form an assembly line: Place the ricotta mixture and beefy marinara sauce nearby, then add the fillings to the cooked lasagna noodles assembly-line style. This is also a really great time for kids to help with preparing dinner.

Begin baking covered with foil:

Cover the roll-ups with aluminum foil to trap some of the heat inside the casserole dish and to avoid over-browning the cheese.

LASAGNA ROLL-UPS

Makes: 6 servings

Cooking spray

1 medium yellow onion

2 cloves garlic

8 ounces low-moisture mozzarella cheese

2 ounces Parmesan cheese

12 dried lasagna noodles (not no-boil, about 3/3 of a 1-pound box)

1 tablespoon olive oil

1 ½ teaspoons kosher salt, divided, plus more for cooking noodles

1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

12 ounces lean ground beef 1 (24- to 32-ounce) jar marinara sauce

1 teaspoon dried Italian seasoning

1 (15- to 16-ounce) container whole-milk ricotta cheese

1 large egg

1. Arrange a rack in the middle of the oven and heat the oven to 375 degrees. Coat a 9-by-13-inch baking dish and a rimmed baking sheet with cooking spray.

2. Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil over medium-high heat. Meanwhile, dice 1 medium yellow onion (about 1 ½ cups) and mince 2 garlic cloves. Grate 8 ounces low-moisture mozzarella cheese on large holes of a box grater (about 2 cups). Finely grate 2 ounces Parmesan cheese on small holes of a box grater (about 1 cup packed), if needed, or measure out ½ cup store-bought grated.

3. Add 12 dried lasagna noodles to the boiling water and cook 1 minute less than package directions, about 7 minutes. Drain and arrange 5 to 6 noodles in a single layer on the baking sheet and top with a sheet of parchment paper. Repeat with another layer of noodles, more parchment paper and a third layer of noodles on top.

4. Meanwhile, heat 1 tablespoon olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat until shimmering. Add onion, 1 teaspoon of kosher salt, 1 teaspoon dried Italian seasoning and ½ teaspoon black pepper. Cook until onion is tender and just beginning to brown, 4 to 5 minutes. Add garlic and cook until fragrant, 30 seconds to 1 minute. Add 12 ounces lean ground beef and cook, breaking up the meat into smaller pieces with a wooden spoon, until browned and cooked through, 5 to 7 minutes. Add 1 jar marinara sauce, stir to combine and remove from the heat.

5. Spread 1 % cups of the meat sauce evenly over the bottom of the prepared baking dish.


6. Place 1 container whole-milk ricotta cheese, 1 large egg, the remaining ½ teaspoon kosher salt, ½ cup of the mozzarella cheese and half of the Parmesan cheese in a large bowl and stir to combine.

7. Spread about 3 tablespoons of the ricotta mixture and 1 tablespoon of the meat sauce onto each lasagna noodle. Starting at a short end, roll them up one by one. Arrange seam-side down in the baking dish. Spoon the remaining meat sauce over the lasagna rolls and sprinkle with the remaining mozzarella and Parmesan cheeses.

8. Cover baking dish tightly with aluminum foil. Bake for 10 minutes. Uncover and bake until sauce is bubbling around edges, lasagna rolls are heated through, and the cheeses are beginning to brown, 15 to 20 minutes more. If your baking dish is broiler-safe, turn the oven to broil and broil until the cheese on top is browned in spots, 1 to 2 minutes.

Make ahead: The lasagna roll-ups can be assembled and refrigerated unbaked up to two days in advance, or frozen for up to one month. Thaw the frozen lasagna roll-ups for in the refrigerator before baking.

sh Wednesday kicked off the 40-day Lenten period leading up to Easter and, with it, the beloved tradition of Friday night fish fries. But what if you'd rather spend a cozy evening at home, or simply love fried fish any night of the week?

This Mexican fish recipe from chef Pati Jinich's cookbook, "Treasures of the Mexican Table," is an unconventional option for those who associate Lent with the traditional favorite of cod. Mexican "through and through," you'll find variations of it up and down the coast, Jinich writes, with different cooks and restaurants adding their own spin with different chilies.

Her take on the dish treats fish lovers to delicate filets of flounder first seared in hot butter, then topped with a nutty, garlicky sauce of slivered almonds sauteed in butter with slivers of dried guajillo chiles and thinly sliced garlic. It's full of flavor with a nice, crunchy texture. Even better: The entire dish takes about 10 minutes start to finish.

To complete the Lenten theme with a cheesy side, it's paired with an elegant (but easy) mashed potato "crown" baked in a Bundt pan and sliced like a cake.

The potato recipe easily serves 8, so there are bound to be leftovers — Jinich suggests panfrying the slices in a bit of butter, and topping them with fried eggs and salsa.

You can find bagged guajillo chiles (the dried form of mirasol chiles) in the Mexican food section of most larger grocery stores.

PAN-FRIED FISH WITH GARLIC, ALMONDS AND GUAJILLOS AND POTATO CROWN

Makes: 4 servings, with plenty of leftover potato crown

For the fish:

2 pounds flounder or sole fillets or other skinless, mild-tasting whitefleshed fish

1 teaspoon kosher salt, or to taste Freshly ground black pepper 4 tablespoon unsalted butter, divided

¼ cup vegetable oil, divided 15 garlic cloves, sliced (about ½ cup)

2 dried guajillo chiles, stemmed, seeded and thinly sliced or snipped with scissors

1/3 cup slivered almonds 2 limes, halved

For the potato crown:

4 tablespoons unsalted butter, at room temperature, plus more for pan 2 tablespoons bread crumbs

4 pounds red potatoes, peeled and cut into chunks

⅓ cup heavy cream

2 tablespoons all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking powder ¾ cup grated melting cheese, such as asadero, Oaxaca, Monterey Jack or mozzarella

½ cup grated añejo, cotija or Parmigiano-Reggiano

3 large eggs, well beaten

1. Prepare potato crown: Preheat oven to 400 degrees, with rack in the middle. Butter a 10-inch Bundt pan and dust with bread crumbs.

2. Bring a large saucepan of salted water to a boil. Add potatoes, reduce heat to medium and simmer until potatoes are tender, about 20 minutes. Drain and place in large bowl.

3. Add butter and cream to the potatoes, and mash with a potato masher or fork until smooth.

4. Stir the flour, baking powder and

2 teaspoons salt in a small bowl, then stir into potato mixture. Stir in both cheeses. Stir in eggs and mix until thoroughly incorporated.

5. Scrape potatoes into the Bundt pan and smooth the top. Bake for 55 minutes, or until potatoes are fluffed and golden. Remove from oven and allow to sit for a few minutes.

6. While potatoes are resting, prepare fish.

7. Season fish with salt and pepper to taste. Heat 2 tablespoons of butter and 2 tablespoons oil in a large skillet, preferably nonstick, over medium-high heat.

8. Once the butter melts and bubbles, add half of the fillets in a single layer without crowding the pan. Sear for 1-2 minutes on the first side. Before turning, run a spatula under the fish to make sure that the fillets aren't sticking,

9. Turn and cook for 1-2 minutes on the other side, until fish can be flaked with a fork. Transfer to a platter

10. Heat the remaining 2 tablespoons each butter and oil and cook the remaining fillets. Transfer to the platter

11. Add garlic and guajillo chiles to the pan, stir and cook for about 30 seconds, until fragrant and beginning to color. Add the almonds and stir as everything browns and crisps, no more than a minute. Scrape the garlic mixture over the fish.

12. Invert potatoes onto a serving platter, and serve immediately with the fish, with lime halves for squeezing.

Make Lowcountry classic at home

visit to South Carolina's Lowcountry means more than Palmetto trees and pralines. I should know, after spending the weekends as a grad student driving from one end of the state to the coast for one reason: the food. The region's restaurants serve the best briny oysters, bowls of freshly caught shrimp nestled on top of creamy grits and my favorite, she-crab soup. But I shouldn't have to wait for a trip to South Carolina to serve this seafood stew.

Here's how to make the Lowcountry classic in your own kitchen. This creamy crab chowder is a specialty of Charleston. Scottish settlers brought partan bree, a traditional rice-and-crab bisque, with them when they emigrated in the 1700s. William Deas, chef and butler to Charleston's mayor in the early 1900s, is credited with adding the red-orange roe to the now-famous soup.

Classically, she-crab soup distinguishes itself from other seafood chowders with the combination of crabmeat and crab roe. The roe gives the chowder its traditional orange hue and distinctive briny flavor. Crab roe, or the eggs from the female crab, are only available in the spring, making she-crab soup a seasonal specialty.

Today, crab roe can be difficult (if not impossible) to find because to protect the crab population, you aren't allowed to harvest egg-carrying female crabs in many states. But an absence of roe doesn't mean you have to forgo this decadent dish altogether. Make this special soup at home using lump crabmeat. Pull out the biggest clusters of crab for finishing the soup. Add the rest of the crab to a Dutch oven with rich cream, briny clam juice, lemon juice and a dash of sherry.

SHE-CRAB SOUP

Makes: 4 servings 1 ½ cups whole milk or

1 cup heavy cream

½ teaspoon hot sauce, such as Tabasco, plus more for serving

1 small yellow onion

2 stalks celery

half-and-half

4 cloves garlic

½ medium lemon

1 pound lump crabmeat 5 sprigs fresh parsley, for serving (optional)

4 tablespoons (½ stick) unsalted butter

1 teaspoon kosher salt

¼ teaspoon ground white pepper
¼ teaspoon ground nutmeg

3 tablespoons all-purpose flour

1 (8-ounce) bottle clam juice, divided

2 tablespoons dry sherry, plus more for serving

1. Place 1 ½ cups whole milk or half-and-half, 1 cup heavy

cream and ½ teaspoon hot sauce in a large measuring cup or medium bowl and let sit at room temperature while you prepare the remaining ingredients.

2. Prepare the following, adding each to same medium bowl as you complete it: Grate 1 small yellow onion on large holes of a box grater (about 1/3 cup). Finely chop 2 celery stalks (about 1 cup). Mince 4 garlic cloves.

3. Prepare the following, keeping each separate as you complete it: Finely grate the zest of ½ medium lemon until you have ½ teaspoon zest. Gently pick through 1 pound lump crabmeat to remove any shells or cartilage. Reserve 4 ounces (about 1 cup) of the crab for serving. Pick the leaves from 5 fresh parsley sprigs and coarsely chop if desired (1 tablespoon).

4. Melt 4 tablespoons unsalted butter in a Dutch oven over medium-low heat. Add the onion mixture, 1 teaspoon kosher salt, ¼ teaspoon ground white pepper and

¼ teaspoon ground nutmeg. Cook until the onion is softened but not browned, about 5 minutes.

5. Add 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour and cook, stirring constantly, until flour coats vegetables, is cooked but not browned, and starts to leave a film on bottom of pot, about 2 minutes. Add ¼ cup clam juice and cook, scraping any browned bits from the bottom of the pan, until the liquid evaporates, about 2 ½ minutes.

6. Add the remaining ¾ cup clam juice, milk mixture and crab. Bring to a simmer and cook, whisking often, until thickened, about 10 minutes. Remove the pot from the heat. Add the lemon zest and 2 tablespoons dry sherry and stir to combine. Taste and season with more kosher salt or white pepper as needed.

7. Divide reserved 4 ounces crab meat between 4 bowls, then ladle the warm soup on top. Garnish with the parsley and serve with more dry sherry or hot sauce if desired.

s host of "The Daily Show" from 1999 to 2015, Jon Stewart changed comedy – and arguably journalism too – with sharp, satirical takes on politics and current events. He became an essential part of the nation's conversation.

Stewart, who walked away from "The Daily Show" to much fanfare, returned to his old perch Monday night. He has agreed to host each Monday through the election, and to executive produce the weeknight show for Comedy Central into next year to help it through another transition.

Comebacks are hard enough in an industry that doesn't always reward second acts. Catching lightning again will be difficult – particularly at a time when late-night television is greatly diminished as a cultural force and others, some from Stewart's family tree, are now competitors.

It can be even tougher when, as Salon critic Melanie McFarland put it, the current Jon Stewart is forced to compete with memories of the old Jon Stewart.

"The world has changed," says veteran television executive Doug Herzog, who hired Stewart and his successor, Trevor Noah, for Comedy Central. "The media environment has changed. The business has changed. It's just so different. I'll never speak for Jon, but he's always been about going forward, he's not about moving backwards. And that's what I would expect him to do."

Stewart had hit his stride in the early 2000s. At the time, political humor had largely consisted of tame one-liners before Stewart and his team of mock

"correspondents" – people you've come to know well like Steve Carell and Stephen Colbert – dove into the news of the day. He exposed double-talk, pointed out hypocrisy and could draw laughter with a wide-eyed look of incredulousness or fear.

Studies found "The Daily Show" was a key news source for many young Americans. Stewart's comedy targeted journalists too. CNN canceled its political debate show "Crossfire" after Stewart skewered a then-bowtied Tucker Carlson.

"Jon Stewart totally changed the face of late-night," says Robert Thompson, director of the Bleier Center for Television and Popular Culture at Syracuse University.

And the television executive who lured Stewart back, Chris McCarthy, called him "the voice of our generation."

Stewart hasn't been talking about it publicly, although he did offer a joke — what else? — on social media. "After much reflection I have decided to enter the transfer portal for my last year of eligibility," he said on X, the platform formerly known as Twitter.

He ended his previous hosting stint on Aug. 6, 2015, precisely as Trump emerged as a force in presidential politics. Some of Stewart's fans were sorely disappointed that he was not there to offer his nightly take on the Trump presidency.

Tough political humor didn't leave with Stewart and has even thrived. Colbert makes Donald Trump a nightly punching bag on CBS. John Oliver, an alumni of "The Daily Show," has an award-winning, issue-oriented show on HBO. Another "Daily" veteran, Samantha Bee, held forth on TBS from 2016 to 2022. Jimmy Kimmel and Seth Meyers are tartly topical, and Greg Gutfeld seeks laughs from a

conservative perspective on Fox News Channel.

So Stewart will return to a crowded field of comics looking to mine much of the same material.

His appearances on Mondays – the same nights that Rachel Maddow does her once-a-week show on MSNBC – offer liberals a television murderer's row.

It's a more serious Stewart that fans have gotten to know since he left, both through his activism on behalf of rescue workers from Sept. 11, 2001, and his short-lived show on the Apple TV+ streaming service, "The Problem with Jon Stewart." It's legitimate to ask whether his comedy will be able to get rolling again after a nine-year absence, on the air just once a week, and if he can assemble a staff of writers as good as he once had.

Popular culture is littered with stars who tried to come back but could never recapture the magic — Arsenio Hall, Lucille Ball and Roseanne Barr are examples just from comedy.

Often it had little to do with talent. The moment had simply passed, and Thompson worries that the same might be true now.

Late-night comedy has far less of an imprint on the culture now than it did when Americans turned off the bedroom light after hearing Johnny Carson's monologue, or even when Stewart went away.

Rather than stay up late, many Americans now log on to the internet the next morning to catch late-night highlights, the best jokes.

"People don't talk about late-night anymore," Herzog said. "Night in and night out, it doesn't play the same cultural role. We don't stay up to watch Johnny Carson anymore, Cher on David Letterman, whatever it was. I don't feel like it's there anymore. It's fragmented and gotten smaller, just like everything else."

During the 2014-15 season, "The Daily Show," Jimmy Fallon's "Tonight," Kimmel and Letterman in his last year at CBS collectively averaged 10.5 million viewers, according to the Nielsen company. The same four shows – Colbert in place of Letterman – have 4.8 million viewers now. The shows took in \$859 million in ad revenue in 2015. Through last November, the 2023 tally was \$259 million, the ad intelligence provider Vivvix said.

Separate out "The Daily Show," and the decline is much sharper. Stewart had more than 1.3 million viewers in his last season; Trevor Noah was down to 372,000 in 2022. And those numbers surely dropped last year with the botched effort to find a successor. During Stewart's last full year in 2014, "The Daily Show" earned an estimated \$129 million in advertising revenue. Last year it was down to \$19 million through November, per Vivvix.

Dominated for years by white men, the format has grown stale, McFarland says.

"I don't think the late-night scene is going to go away entirely," she says. "But it needs to remake itself."

Older viewers will surely be curious to see if Stewart still has it. The same might not be true for younger people who know Stewart by reputation only. And is the 61-year-old the right person to pinpoint another generation of talent?

"Jon's got a way of seizing the moment," Herzog says. "Everything has changed. We're not going back in time, but I do have the confidence that Jon will find a way forward. Jon is good that way."

We'll see. No pressure.

War and Treaty traveling the road to success

From small town to the Grammys, duo take world by storm

ichael Trotter Jr. was lost. Spiritually, yes, but we'll get to that in a minute. More immediately, he was physically lost, on the road late one night while driving through Michigan with his wife, Tanya, and his eyelids were growing heavy.

So the Army veteran pulled off Interstate 94 to find a hotel to rest until morning and ended up at a Days Inn in Albion. And from that point on, nothing for the couple would ever be the

Trotter and his wife make up the rousing musical duo the War and Treaty, the fiery country-blues-rock-Americana twosome who have taken the music world by storm. The pair's major-label debut album "Lover's Game" was released last March to wide acclaim and landed the duo two nominations at this year's Grammy Awards, including best new artist.

Since the Grammy nominations, the War and Treaty has been everywhere, performing at the Detroit Lions' Thanksgiving Day game, the Emmy Awards, the CMA Awards, NBC's "Christmas at Graceland" special and an episode of WWE's "Smackdown."

And it all stems from what they formed and fortified in Albion, as they wrapped their arms around a small community that embraced the couple right back.

Before the Trotters found Albion, they found each other on Aug. 28, 2010, at a music festival outside Baltimore, where both were performing.

At the time, Michael Trotter Jr. was an Iraq War veteran struggling with PTSD and trying to find his footing in the music business, and Tanya Blount was an industry veteran who had flirted with fame – that's her in 1993's "Sister Act 2: Back in the Habit," performing "His Eye is on the Sparrow" alongside Lauryn Hill – but had never quite knocked down the door.

They were introduced by a mutual friend and their connection was immediate – phone numbers were quickly exchanged – but Michael Trotter Jr. says he initially backed off, out of fear.

"I wasn't looking for anything. I didn't have my life together," says Trotter, who had already been married and divorced in his 20s. "I had low self-esteem, and I wasn't trying to approach Tanya. Tanya was damn near perfect,

and I didn't want to mess it up. So I tossed her number in the garbage, and I walked away.

"I was just used to losing, and this was a win, a win I didn't feel like I deserved," he says. "So I wasn't going to trick myself into believing I belonged in her world"

Tanya Trotter, who also had been married previously, felt differently, and she reached out to him the following day, asking him to work on music. At the time, she was performing in a group with her brother.

"Michael came over the next day, and he had a complete album written for my brother and me, which I had never seen before," she says. "I've seen people write lyrics, but I've never seen someone have complete songs, I've never seen someone who hears every part, every note, from the drum patterns to the strings, to the keyboard, guitar, bass, everything. He had everything in his head."

The Trotters sang together on a demo track, and when a friend heard their voices blend, "she said, 'You guys are going to have to consider doing that," Tanya Trotter says.

And that was that: They were married soon thereafter.

It was at Blues at the Bohm Theatre in Albion where Cliff Harris first saw Michael Trotter Jr. perform and knew he had to meet the big-voiced belter. Harris, a professor of chemistry and biochemistry at Albion College, is also a musician, but the trajectory of his career changed after he heard Trotter sing.

"I went from being the lead singer of my band to the manager of their band," says Harris, who with his wife, Karen Erlandson, managed the Trotters "for a hot minute." he says.

They promoted the duo's first concert as the War and Treaty at Albion's Washington Gardner Elementary School, where the band was paid a whopping \$75 for the performance.

Harris and Erlandson signed the group to a management contract, knowing full well that they would soon be on to bigger and better things.

"When we signed the papers, we said, 'We know this

is temporary. When you get the next offer, don't worry. Just let us know, we're happy for you," Harris says.

When they eventually signed a deal with Universal Music Group, Harris vowed to never manage another group "because now I can say every band I've ever managed has gone straight to Universal," he says with a hearty chuckle.

Harris says he remembers watching the War and Treaty — the name stems from a passionate argument and subsequent makeup between the couple — perform for 75 people at the Bohm, knowing there was a larger audience out there for the couple. The duo's sound is steeped in gospel and the blues, and it's undeniably powerful. It was just a matter of connecting the dots.

"The way that Michael and Tanya make you feel, it's like going to a church service. I'm not particularly religious, but after a War and Treaty concert, I feel renewed," Harris says.

After the duo released its debut album, "Healing Tide," recorded in Nashville, Tennessee, and featuring a collaboration with Emmylou Harris, national bookings were pouring in, including slots at 2018's Newport Folk Festival and Bonnaroo. The couple played shows with Al Green and recorded with Jason Isbell.

Last year was a banner year for the duo, following the release of "Lover's Game." The couple recorded songs with the Brothers Osborne and Zach Bryan, and were nominated for a slew of trophies at the CMT Music Awards, the Academy of Country Music Awards and the Country Music Association Awards.

At the Grammys, in addition to a nod for best American roots song, they faced a crowded field for best new artist, which was awarded to Victoria Monét.

"It's a feeling that I can't really put into words. It's amazing that people are still discovering us and that our peers have acknowledged us this time around," Tanya Trotter says. "We're new to a lot of people, and it's a pleasure to be able to live long enough to experience it, and to be able to celebrate just being nominated."

The duo is working on a new album set for release later this year – first single "Mr. Fun" was recently released – and have tour dates set this year with Chris Stapleton and Zach Bryan. They're even shopping a script that would bring their love story to the big screen, with John Legend attached as a producer.

A safety net under stress

Community health centers help 1 in 11 Americans obtain medical care, food

lisa Reyes has come to

 for doctor's appointments
 for more than a decade.

She moved away a while ago but keeps returning – even if it means a two-hour roundtrip bus ride.

That's because her two children see the same doctor she does. Because when she's sick, she can walk in without an appointment. Because the staff at the Queens clinic helped her apply for health insurance and food stamps.

"I feel at home. They also speak my language," Reyes, 33, said in Spanish. "I feel comfortable."

Plaza del Sol is one of two dozen sites run by Urban Health Plan Inc., which is one of nearly 1,400 federally designated community health centers. One in 11 Americans rely on these to get routine medical care, social services and, in some cases, fresh food.

The clinics serve as a critical safety net in every state and U.S. territory for low-income people of all ages. But it's starting to buckle under stress.

Since 2012, community health centers have seen a 45% increase in the number of people seeking care — and they've opened more service sites to expand their footprint to more than 15,000 locations.

Many centers are short-staffed and struggling to compete for doctors, mental health professionals, nurses and dentists. Leaders also said that funding is an ever-present concern, with the monthslong debate over the federal budget making it all but impossible for them to plan and hire for the long term.

Community health centers have been around for decades, and are largely what remains when urban and rural hospitals close or cut back on services.

Dr. Matthew Kusher, Plaza del Sol's clinical director, said there are things that prescriptions can't change, like stopping the spread of flu and COVID-19 when people live in apartments with one family per room and it's impossible to quarantine.


"What we provide here is only 20% of what goes toward somebody's health," Kusher said. "Their health is more driven by the other factors, more driven by the poverty, and the lack of access to food or clean water or healthy

Nine in 10 health center patients live at or below 200% of the federal poverty line, according

to the U.S. Health Resources and Services Administration. Beyond that:

- In 2022, nearly 1.4 million health center patients were homeless.
 - One in 5 was uninsured.
 - Half were on Medicaid.
- One in 4 was best served in a language other than English; about 63% were racial or ethnic minorities.

Dr. Acklema Mohammad started 50 years ago as a medical assistant in Urban Health Plan's first clinic, San Juan Health Center in New York City. She has cared for families across three generations.

"It's so gratifying to work in this community. I'm walking through the door, or I'm walking down the street, and I'm getting hugs," she said. "All along, 'Oh, Dr. Mo! You're still here!"

Staffing is Mohammad's biggest worry. Many pediatricians retired or changed jobs after the pandemic. It's not just about money, either: She said job applicants tell her they want quality of life and flexibility.

"It's a big job and it's a big issue because we have so many sick children and so many sick patients," Mohammad said, "but we don't have enough providers to take care of them."

Former pediatricians are sometimes picking up virtual visits to provide relief, she said, and telehealth helps, too. But when telehealth is not a possibility, El Nuevo San Juan Health Center tries to bring care to people instead.

About 150 elders get at-home visits, said Dr. Manuel Vazquez, Urban Health Plan's vice president of medical affairs who oversees the program. There are times when the care isn't covered, but the team does it without pay.

One of the nation's first community health centers opened in the rural Mississippi delta in 1967, in the wake of the Civil Rights Movement's Freedom Summer.

Today, Delta Health Center in Mound Bayou, Mississippi, has 17 locations in five counties, including free-standing clinics and some in schools.

Access to preventive care is critical as area hospitals cut back on neonatal services and other specialty care, said Temika Simmons, Delta Health Center's chief public affairs officer.

"If you're in the middle of a heart attack, you're going to have to be airlifted to Jackson or Memphis where they have the equipment to save your life, and so you might die along the way," she said. "So, what we've been doing in terms of primary care is trying to keep people away from that part."

Another key to the centers' ability to improve health disparities is understanding and being part of their communities. Plaza del Sol is located in the heavily immigrant, mostly Latino neighborhood of Corona, which was the epicenter of New York City's COVID-19 spread. Staff are required to speak Spanish.

The Mississippi Delta staffers are trained to spot signs of abuse, Simmons said, or know that the patient "fussing and fighting" about filling out a form likely can't read.

To continue to serve the communities in the way they want to, center leaders say they're stretching dollars are far as they can – but need more.

Based on the rising number of patients and inflation in the health care sector, federal funding for centers would need to increase by \$2.1 billion to match 2015 funding levels, according to an analysis sponsored by the National Association of Community Health Centers.

"You can't be overwhelmed with the problem," Simmons said. "You've got to just simply take it one day at a time, one patient at a time."

'24 Aston Martin DB12 makes perfect sports car proposition

omance is dead. The idea of refined, beautiful things is a notion that has been replaced by a post-industrial aesthetic that has utterly ruined product design. It doesn't matter if it's distressed denim, a mangy old barn door repurposed as a bathroom door or automobile design that takes its cues from video games. All new design is devised to shock or abuse our sense of beauty.

It's no wonder that Ralph Lauren's design vision, one that embraces the greatness of traditional American design, remains so incredibly popular and widely accepted. Or that Aston Martin, and its adherence to traditional sports cars values, remains so beloved worldwide.

That's what makes the 2024 Aston Martin DB12 one of the world's great sports cars. But Aston

Martin would prefer you call it a super tourer.

If the DB12 looks familiar, it should. It dates to the 1948 Aston Martin 2-liter Sports, now known as the DB1. For 2024, the 75th anniversary of the DB1, the DB12 arrives looking much like its predecessor, the DB11. And indeed, it does wear the DB11's doors and borrows the DBS's roof. But look closely and you'll see changes. The DB12's front end is higher and sports a larger grille. The headlamps

have been redesigned, as has the front splitter and side mirrors. And look closely at its footwear. It's the first car in the fitted with Michelin's new Pilot Sport 5S tires.

Under the hood, you might be expecting to find a V12 – but you'd be wrong. In its place is a Aston-Martin-revised Mercedes-AMG twin-turbocharged 4.0 V8 engine that produces 671 horsepower and 590 pound-feet of torque. That's an increase of 34 percent from the DB11. The driveline includes five driving modes: GT, Sport, Sport+, Individual, and, for the first time, Wet.

Hop in the car and you'll find much the DB11's perfect driving position remains intact. So too are the power seat switches on the side of the center console. The placement is less than ideal for those with longer legs. Bracing your leg against the center console inadvertently moves the seats, as I discovered to my dismay. And yeah, you could grouse against the

minuscule trunk. But this is a sports car – um – make that super tourer. If you need more space, pack lighter or look elsewhere.

But there's much to like about the center stack, which has been reworked from the DB11. Gone are the round push-buttons for the transmission atop the center of the instrument panel. Instead, a toggle shifter is standard, much like those used on other European cars.

The DB11 is certainly a grand touring car rather than a sports car. In other words, while it could go fast, comfort was nearly as important as velocity. The steering is linear, quick and direct, and the car carves through corners without a trace of wallow, eager to follow the driver's orders. It stakes out the space between hardcore sports cars like the Ferrari Roma and Porsche 911 Turbo, and grand tourers like the Bentley Continental GT.

And that makes the perfect proposition in a high-dollar sporting driving machine.

A SERIOUS THREAT

If healthy, Jalen Brunson and Knicks are capable of doing damage when NBA playoffs start this spring

e don't know what the Knicks can do over the second half of the year simply because we don't know when they are going to be whole. It seems now that everybody except Mike Breen and Walt Frazier got hurt as the Knicks limped into the All-Star Break, and we all saw what happened after they lit up January the way they did, were well on their way to No. 2 in the Eastern Conference.

So we don't know what they can do when the season starts up again. Or what they can be. But if they do get healthy, if they get Julius Randle back sooner rather than later and Mitchell Robinson really can come back before the season is over, this is what they have shown even before we see how things are going to look with Randle and OG Anunoby and Bojan Bogdanovic on the court together:

They are as good as anybody in the conference behind the Celtics.

And maybe, just maybe, the real dream in the spring in our city is a major basketball event out of the past, which means a big playoff series between the Knicks and the Celtics, the way it used to be when the great Dave DeBusschere would say, "Just throw the f-king money on the table, we'll be there."

Again and again: This is all predicated on Tom Thibodeau getting his players back, meaning the ones he started the season with and the ones he picked up along the way. We saw what a difference-maker Anunoby was on the wing when the Knicks got him from Toronto. And soon, if the basketball gods are friendly, we will see how the Knicks roll when OG and Bogdanovic really are on the court together, and Randle is back to being the physical presence he has been since he got to town.

Most of all, we will see how Jalen Brunson makes it all work. Whatever puncher's chance the Knicks are going to have the rest of the way, whatever they can be if and when they are healthy again, starts with him

He is the best and most complete point guard the Knicks have had since Clyde. He is as important to this Knicks team as Steph Curry is to the Warriors. He has made himself as important as any Knick since Patrick Ewing, and that includes what Carmelo Anthony did and what he gave the Knicks a decade ago, when the Knicks won 54 games and the Atlantic Division.

This Knicks team is a much better team than that one was, just off what we saw in January, and that means even with Robinson already gone for awhile; before OG and Bogdanovic and Alec Burks got here; after Randle got hurt. You have to keep talking about health, because that is going to be the whole ballgame the rest of the way. But if they do get healthy and whole, this has the chance to be the best basketball time at the Garden since the Knicks made their run from No. 8 all the way to the NBA Finals a quarter-of-a-century ago.

The only team in the Eastern Conference that has been demonstrably better than the Knicks so far this season is the Celtics, who have been better than everybody. The Bucks, even after a coaching change, are still a mess. Joel Embiid is hurt again for the Sixers, and no one knows when he is going to play again. The Cavaliers have been terrific so far, and they are the ones currently holding down No. 2 in the conference, but what Knicks fan who saw the Knicks beat the Cavs in the first round last season would bet against their team doing it again?

The Knicks had won 15 of 18 before everybody started going down, and now they have predictably dropped down in the standings, or they would be the ones right there behind the Celtics. And understand: Nobody in your sport ever throws you a pity party when your main guys get hurt. It happens to everybody. Now it has been happening to the Knicks. It doesn't change the run they had made before falling back



and falling down.

You know why the Knicks made such a fuss after that bad call against the Rockets the other night, and acted as if it was the first and only call like it in the history of the NBA? It wasn't just because the refs admitted they were wrong afterward. It was because the Knicks needed the game. And might need it down the road

when the seedings in the East get locked in place. The Knicks fully understand what the possibilities are for them once the sides really are again even. If they can get even before things continue to get worse in the standings.

It would be a shame if it happened that way, for this particular group. There have been other fine moments for Thibodeau's Knicks since he got to town. They shocked everybody and got to No. 4 in the conference in the 2020-21 season. A year ago, they gave the Heat all they could have wanted in the playoffs before it truly was Brunson against the world in Game 6.

But then came January 2024. Then came the New Year. They played 16 games in January and Animal Shelters are about to have a lifetime supply of food thanks to Pete Alonso.

won 14 and the two they lost, to the Mavericks and the Magic, were each by four points. Suddenly the rest of the league was paying attention to what was happening at the Garden again. And with each win, it became more and more clear that Jalen Brunson had become the biggest sports star in town.

Maybe that will change once we get a look at Juan Soto at Yankee Stadium. Maybe it will change when Aaron Judge and Pete Alonso start hitting home runs. Chris Jones played the game of his life, the way Justin Tuck and Michael Strahan once did when the Giants knocked off the 18-0 Patriots in Super Bowl XLII.

Travis Kelce caught nine balls.

Andy Reid and Steve Spagnuolo, Reid's defensive coordinator, were brilliant all game long.

But the headliner for Super Bowl LVIII, the way he

is the headliner in American sports right now, was Patrick Mahomes.

HIS ROUGH START

Knicks' Brunson loses in 1st round of 3-point contest; Lillard repeats title

He fell one short.

Jalen Brunson's start to his first career NBA All-Star Weekend ended one made three shy of advancing to the second round.

He finished with a final score of 24 points but needed 26 to avoid an early elimination.

His final missed shot was a money ball worth two points instead of one.

And the Knicks' star was done-in by a flurry of missed threes both to start and end his Three-Point Contest debut.

He missed four of his first five attempts from the left corner, and after he made seven threes in a row – totaling 11 threes made in a 13-attempt span – he missed his final three shots from the right corner.

A tough way to go for a 41.1% shooter from three-point range this season.

Brunson, however, doesn't need any hardware to validate his three-point prowess. He has already made 139 threes through 52 regular-season games this season.

That's five more than he made all of last season with the Knicks, toting back-to-back career-best efficiency seasons from downtown since he signed in New York as a free

 $agent\ two\ summer\ ago.$

In fact, Brunson has tallied 273 made threes since joining the Knicks.

That's only 11 threes shy of his final tally of threes made over four seasons in Dallas.

And even though he entered All-Star Weekend teetering from downtown – he is shooting 31.4% from three in the month of February having made just 11 of his last 35 attempts – Brunson is on pace to eclipse that 273 mark by March.

He is averaging a career-best 27.6 points and 6.5 assists on 48.3% shooting from the field. Brunson was nearly voted an All-Star starter, but lost to Bucks star Damian Lillard by more than 700,000 fan votes.

Brunson ultimately lost the Three-Point Contest to Lillard. too.

The first round of the Three-Point Contest finished in a four-way tie between Lillard, the reigning champion; Minnesota's stretchfour Karl-Anthony Towns; Indiana's Tyrese Haliburton and Atlanta's Trae Young.

The four stars finished the first round with 26 points each, but Haliburton – hometown hero playing for the Indiana Pacers – was eliminated in the tiebreaker round.

Lillard caught fire late to repeat as

Three-Point Champion. He became the first player to repeat as a three-point champ since Jason Kapono in 2007.

He is one of just two representatives for the Knicks at All-Star Weekend in Indianapolis. Knicks two-way forward Jacob Toppin represented the organization in Saturday's Slam Dunk Contest.

NBA coaches also voted Julius Randle an All-Star reserve, but Randle, who dislocated his right shoulder at the conclusion of a Jan. 27 matchup against the Miami Heat, was unable to participate.

Brunson will also participate in Sunday's All-Star Game as an Eastern Conference reserve.

And after competing in his first Three-Point Contest, the Knicks star has now gotten his toes wet in All-Star Weekend festivities.

Given his rapid ascent into stardom, Brunson will assuredly be back, representing the Knicks during the mid-February break in the future.

Next time, he'll know what to expect when he steps onto the floor, if he decides to compete in the Three-Point Contest again

NBA is hoping for a little more competitiveness in All-Star Game

INDIANAPOLIS – Last season's All-Star Game played out in a way that the NBA hopes to never experience again. Nobody was interested in defense and almost nobody was watching the game, at least according to the abysmal television ratings.

So, the league sent a message: Make the All-Star Game better.

How that'll work is anyone's guess. But they'll give it a shot on Sunday night, when the NBA's midseason showcase game returns to Indianapolis for the first time in nearly four decades — with a return to the old no-draft, Eastern Conference vs. Western Conference, 48-minute game format that the league had gotten away from in recent years.

Nobody wants, or expects, Game 7, playoff-type intensity. Nobody is going to risk injury, nor should they, and everyone can agree that injuries — Golden State's Stephen Curry, Phoenix's Kevin Durant, the Los Angeles Lakers' LeBron James and Milwaukee's Giannis Antetokounmpo all either missed the game entirely or played very briefly because of injuries — helped doom the ratings.

A little competitiveness might lead to a bounceback.

"We've talked about it a little bit," said Curry, now a 10-time All-Star. "It's just coming with the right energy where everybody knows kind of the speed of the game, physicality of the game, and you can kind of make those adjustments whether you're starting, whether you're coming off the bench — playing a little bit of defense — and kind of taking it from there wherever the game goes."

The final score of last year's game, where James and Ante-tokounmpo served as captains: Team Giannis 184, Team LeBron 175. Boston's Jayson Tatum set an All-Star Game record by scoring 55 points and the game had a to-tal – total – of four free throws, all of them shot by Antetokounmpo's team.

"Hot take: I probably won't score 55 points tomorrow;" Tatum said Saturday.

We know this much, though: Scoring won't be hard to find. There's going to be a ton of 3-pointers attempted – there were 126 tried last year in this game – and most of them won't exactly be fired off with a defender coming in a full sprint to close out the shooter.

"I want it to be more competitive. I think it can be more competitive," said Milwaukee's Doc Rivers, the East coach. "But the health thing, it's an issue with anything. Someone can get hurt in the layup line. You just never know."

Silver unsure if tweaks to 65-game rule needed

Adam Silver held his annual press conference inside Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis Saturday night ahead of other scheduled All-Star festivities.

The NBA commissioner (photo) touched on an array of pressing issues around the league, such as who will be the face of the association when LeBron James eventually retires, what the All-Star format will look like going forward and the obvious lack of defense in today's game.

However, there were a few issues that took precedent over the rest. For starters, the NBA implemented a new 65-game minimum for players to be eligible for certain end-of-season awards, such as Most Valuable Player and All-NBA consideration. Many have taken issue with it.

The new rule, which was agreed upon by players in the league's new collective bargaining agreement, was designed to curb teams from resting players for load management. But Philadelphia's Joel Embiid, the league's reigning MVP, has already been deemed ineligible for end-of-season awards because of this rule. Kyrie Irving, Evan Mobley, Tyler Herro, Bradley Beal, Darius Garland, LaMelo Ball and numerous other stars are also ineligible for postseason awards as of the All-Star break.

Many already think the new rule has hurt more than it has helped the quality of the game. There are players who believe that they now have to push through significant injuries just to remain eligible for postseason



honors. The new 65-game rule is also impacting players who were expected to be eligible for supermax deals. Players must make an All-NBA team, win Defensive Player of the Year or MVP to meet the criteria for that kind of payday.

When asked if it is time to separate supermax eligibility from postseason awards, Silver said he was not sure.

"A lot of thought went into the 65-game demarcation," Silver said. "Not only was it collectively bargained with the players, but we spent an extensive amount of time leading up to collective bargaining talking to all the various constituencies in the league, most importantly the coaches, the general managers, individual players directly... The notion was we needed to further incentivize players, particularly star players, to play more games."

Silver is not ready to say that the 65-game rule is not working.

"So far I can tell you that the number of

games that players have participated in is up this season," Silver said. "And interestingly enough, injuries are actually down. So whether that's meaningful data yet, I don't know. I think the right time to take a further look at this rule is at the end of the season when we at least have a year under our belt."

Among other topics, Silver also touched on the uptick of scoring across the NBA in recent seasons. Stephen Curry, Giannis Antetokounmpo and Devin Booker have all scored at least 60 points since December. Luka Doncic and Joel Embiid have both reached 70 points or better.

There have been more 70-point individual performances in the past two seasons than the previous 40 combined. Some NBA coaches think defense has been legislated out of the game. Silver simply believes that skill level in the NBA is higher than it has ever been, which he pointed to as the biggest factor in the league's recent scoring surge. He said the league just wants competitive

games above all.

"You're seeing this global pool of talent coming into the league, some of the best athletes in the world, who can, frankly, just shoot the lights out," Silver said. "I think that's partly what's responsible for the increased scoring. I disagree with people who feel that teams aren't playing defense ... The defensive intensity is there. Defensive players are asked to cover much larger areas of the court than they had to, historically.

"I actually am pleased with the state of the game. Having said that, I know there are some coaches who feel that we've hampered in some ways defensive players' ability to play defense, at least the way it used to be played in this league. In part, that's been very intentional. There was a period of time in this league when people thought the game had become too physical and we'd taken away some of the aesthetic beauty from the game. I was one of those people that felt that way in the '90s.

"Whether or not there need to be any adjustments now is something we listen to our coaches, we listen to our players, and the competition committee will continue to consider. I think one thing I'd say, people think that fans like high-scoring games. I think fans like to see players have that ability, use these extraordinary talents. I think, on the other hand, what we hear from fans as well is they like defensive intensity and they want players to be able to play physical defense but not in a way that it hampers, as I said, offensive players from using their incredible skills."







CHANGE IN HIS WAYS

Left-hander Rodón knows he has something to prove in '24

TAMPA – As Carlos Rodón sat by his locker at George M. Steinbrenner Field, the noticeably thinner pitcher joked that chasing his three children around helped him get into shape over the offseason.

But the Yankees southpaw and his wife, Ashley, had some help corralling their kids.

"She's our savior," Rodón told the Daily News of a woman the family hired last season. "She does a lot for us. She comes with us and helps us out. She does pretty much everything."

While Rodón preferred to keep the woman's name private, she primarily works as a chef.

"She can make anything," Rodón said, and that skill came in handy as he tried to be more watchful of what he ate over the winter.

Go-to meals included various chicken dishes, zucchini, Brazilian-style potatoes and bok choy.

"There's nothing crazy, nothing that's like, 'Oh my gosh, wow, that's amazing,'"Rodón said, trying to downplay his offseason diet. "I'm just more mindful of what I ingest. At 31, the pounds come on easy."

While Rodón didn't disclose how much weight he's lost, he reported to Tampa in early January less hefty and more toned than last year, when the Yankees listed him at 255 pounds. The new look – which no longer includes a mustache – hasn't gone unrecognized.

"He's been working extremely hard over here and across the street with our personnel," General Manager Brian Cashman said. "I'm really pleased with the position he's put himself in."

Added Aaron Boone: "From where he is right now to 12 months ago is night and day."

Rodón's physical transformation is an encouraging first sign as he also tries to shed the perception that the Yankees made a mistake by signing him to a six-year, \$162 million contract two offseasons

Injuries to Rodón's forearm, back and hamstring limited him to 14 disastrous starts in 2023; he recorded a 6.85 ERA in his first season in pinstripes. The performance fell woefully short of expectations after Rodón posted a 2.67 mark over two All-Star campaigns in 2021 and 2022.

"I kind of just want to let it go. It definitely wasn't easy. I mean, I didn't perform well. And mentally, I probably wasn't in the best spot,



and that's OK," said Rodón, who fought mental and physical battles earlier in his career. "As long as I'm mindful of that and aware of where I was physically and mentally, that's kind of the only way you're gonna grow from it.

"The expectations I had for myself, obviously, are pretty high. In a locker room, you feel like you let down your guys, and we have quite a few amazing players, guys that will probably end up being Hall of Famers. And it wears on you when you know you let them down. Obviously, all of us are trying, but we can get anyone to try, right? I can find someone down the street that would be willing to try to play baseball, right? It's about performing."

Rodón initially resisted 2023 reflections during his interview – "diving into last year is really not going to do much" – but he admitted that his final start, on Sept. 29, still eats at him. That day, he failed to record an out while allowing eight earned runs to an awful Royals team. He also turned his back on Matt Blake when the pitching coach made a mound visit.

Rodón said that day "put the cherry on top" of a season to

forget. However, Blake told The News that there are "no issues" between the two.

"It's one of those ones that you wish you could have back," Blake said. "But at the same time, it's the heat of the battle and you understand sometimes that's going to happen."

Rodón did apologize to the coach after that start, and the two talked throughout the offseason.

"Emotionally, I got out of hand and I was frustrated," said Rodón, who also blew a kiss to heckling fans in Anaheim last July. "I'm not trying to defend myself, but emotionally, it was hard. Unfortunately, I took it out on someone that obviously cares about me and is trying to make me better. It was just kind of one of those things where it's in the moment. Obviously, something I have to be more in control of, not so reactive. I will say it was definitely not my shining moment. It wasn't easy. It's hard to not be reactive in that moment. Not that that's OK."

The Yankees knew that Rodón pitched with emotion when they signed him. As they saw, that fire doesn't only burn when things are going well.

"It's definitely a double-edged sword," Rodón continued. "If I use that emotion and harness it against hitters in the game, the possibilities are endless. But it can go both ways. Now it's just controlling that. And I've gotten better over the years, but obviously, clearly, there's still moments."

So far, Rodon has said and done all the right things when it comes to his body and mind.

In addition to eating better, Blake said the lefty has been consistent with his workouts since the offseason began. Meanwhile, Boone noted that Rodón had been a "really good pupil" over the winter, frequently communicating with the Yankees' pitching coaches and strength and conditioning staff

Rodón also spent a great deal of time refining his movements on the mound over the offseason. The results are paying off early, as he sat in the mid-90s and touched 97 mph during a recent live batting practice session.

This time last year, Rodón sat in the low-90s.

"He's done a lot to improve his prep work in terms of engaging the back hip in different ways so that the range of motion is accessible in the delivery," Blake explained, adding that those tweaks would contribute to the improved velocity. "That's really what starts the whole conversation."

While Rodón has made a lot of changes, none guarantee a turnaround in 2024. However, the Yankees are counting on exactly that as they seek a return to the playoffs, as he is one of several question marks in their rotation.

The veteran, meanwhile, knows that he has something to prove to himself and those around him.

Rodón said that process starts with putting together a few good days at a time between now and Opening Day. Depending on how the Yankees stack their rotation, Rodón's first two starts could come against the rival Astros and the pennant-winning Diamondbacks. Strong outings against those talented clubs would set him up nicely for his first start at Yankee Stadium, where fans repeatedly booed Rodón last season.

With 2023 in the rearview, he's looking forward to the challenge.

"It's gonna be a fun start," Rodón said. "That's for sure."


Expanded arsenal could help Carlos in Year 2

TAMPA – Carlos Rodón has clearly made some change to his physique. Some tweaks to his arsenal may come next.

The lefty, who showed up to camp in significantly better shape after an offseason of healthy eating, has always relied on his fastball and slider. That combo earned him All-Star nods in 2021 and 2022, followed by a huge payday from the Yankees two offseasons ago.

However, Rodón (photo) had far less success in 2023, recording a 6.85 ERA while battling numerous injuries in his first season with the Yankees.

While those injuries, among other factors, surely contributed to Rodón's poor performance, some also wondered if he became too predictable. The 31-year-old threw



"Just upping the usage of those pitches, obviously, will help my arsenal, and I know that," Rodón told the Daily News. "I was so dominant the year before featuring the fastball-slider, and then sprinkling in some curveball. I was so dialed in with those that I was trying to get back to that point. I just wasn't there."

Rodón's fastball and slider actually

graded well last season, according to the Stuff+ metric, which measures the physical characteristics of pitches, including spin rate and movement. However, major league hitters are always evolving. Pitchers need to do the same.

With that in mind, it wouldn't be surprising to see Rodón use his secondary stuff a little more in 2024.

"Giving him more options is important," pitching coach Matt Blake told The News. "Obviously, the bread and butter is the fast-ball-slider, and then kind of always thinking about what are the ways he's going to continue

to evolve and grow, whether it's a changeup, whether it's the curveball, whether there's other things in the conversation. But ultimately, it comes down to him executing the fastball and

the slider and then going from there."

While it sounds like Rodón could expand his repertoire a tad, he didn't want to tip his hand too much. Odds are his heater and slider will still lead the pack by a large margin, but time will tell.

"I'm not gonna tell you everything I'm doing," Rodón said. "That's part of the game. That's for hitters to see when the time comes."

MARINACCIO MATTERS

Ron Marinaccio had an excellent rookie season in 2022, recording a 2.05 ERA over



40 games. By the end of the season, he had entered Aaron Boone's circle of trust, but a shin injury kept him off the Yankees' playoff roster.

That same shin hindered the righty that winter and last season, when he struggled in the majors and minors.

"I don't think he had a good base coming into camp last year just from the lack of lower half strength work and power development," Blake said. "I think he was kind of playing from behind the eight ball last year and it just kind of snowballed on him a little bit. The delivery got out of whack."

Boone added that Marinaccio's shin, while never serious, required maintenance last year. Now, however, the manager said that the 28-year-old is "probably in as good a spot as he's been in a couple years."

With Scott Effross officially out of contention for an Opening Day roster spot, Marinaccio could reclaim a job in the Yankees' bullpen with a strong spring. So far, he's off to solid start.

"He's a factor for us if we can keep him healthy," Blake said.

TREVINO UPDATE

Jose Trevino (calf strain) has begun hitting, Boone said. The catcher has been active in the early days of camp, but the manager still doesn't expect Trevino to play in the first week or two of spring games.

"He couldn't play in a game and run full bore, but everything else, he's pretty much doing now," Boone said. "So he's probably a couple of weeks behind, but able to do quite a bit."



PORT ST. LUCIE — Pete Alonso may end up playing his entire career on the Mets, but as he heads into the final year of his contract, there is no progress on any sort of contract extension with the team that drafted him.

Alonso reported to Mets camp Saturday. He announced a new initiative by the Alonso Foundation, the charitable organization started by the first baseman and his wife Haley: For every home run the slugger hits in 2024, the Alonso Foundation will donate \$1000 to animal shelters to get animals out of facilities that euthanize them because of overcrowding.

But then he faced questions about whether or not he'll be hitting free agency after the conclusion of the 2024 season.

"I've just been sitting back and listening," Alonso said Saturday after working out with the team for the first time this spring. "The contract matters that we've talked about were my one-year contract this year."

Alonso changed representation in anticipation of his first multi-year deal, leaving his representatives at Apex Baseball for Boras Corporation. He offered little in terms of details, only saying it was a move he felt best for him and his family.

Scott Boras typically likes to take clients to free agency to gauge their markets. Historically, the Wilpon family didn't like to deal with Boras, but the agent's relationship with the Mets has changed in recent years as Steve Cohen took over a controlling interest in the club.

Since then, Boras and the Mets have made deals for Max Scherzer and Brandon Nimmo, among others. But so far, nothing for Alonso, a key member of the Mets' core, a popular fan favorite and a power-hitting first baseman.

"I haven't really thought of those scenarios because like, the season is not over," Alonso said. "I just had my first first live BP session. My whole focus this year is to be the best I can be, be as locked in mentally and physically as possible to help this team win. That's my job. We'll see what happens in the future. I don't know what's going to happen. But I'm fully committed to being the best player and best teammate I can be to help this team win."

The 2019 NL Rookie of the Year and a three-time All-Star, Alonso has never hit

fewer than 37 home runs in a full major league season. He has a career OPS+ of 136 in five years, has scored 40 or more runs and has driven in 100 or more in each of the past two seasons. Alonso became the second-fastest player in history to hit 150 home runs, doing so in 538 games (Ryan Howard holds the record with 150 in 495 games).

At 29, he's a prime candidate for an extension. But it doesn't seem as though the Mets have made any offers, other than the \$20.5 million arbitration raise he'll receive this season.

Since his rookie season, Alonso has played for three different managers (nearly four, if you count Carlos Beltran) and will now play for a fourth in Carlos Mendoza. The Mets have had three different general managers (four if you count Jared Porter, who was only on the job for a month), one president of baseball operations and countless hitting coaches.

Though Alonso said the multiple managerial changes didn't bother him, one could hardly blame him if he decided to seek a team that has shown long-term stability.

For now, he likes the moves David Stearns and his front office made over the winter,

and he's looking forward to being reunited with his teammate from the University of Florida, center fielder Harrison Bader.

"We filled a lot of holes," Alonso said. "I'm super stoked about having Harrison back. Harrison is a good buddy of mine and has been a good buddy since college. I know that we've added some really good starting pitching as well, and some great defensive pieces. I feel like we have a great core and it's really exciting. I'm really excited to gel and get to know these guys, not just personally, but on the ball diamond as well when we get games going."

The noise around his contract isn't going to go away anytime soon. It might even grow louder with each home run he hits. This time next year, Alonso could be in a different camp in a different uniform.

Or, he could be right where is right now with plans to stay for the rest of his playing days

"That's something that I've definitely thought about," he said. "I love New York. It's a really special place for my family and I've definitely thought of the idea, definitely welcomed the idea.

"But I can't predict the future."

Mets don't want Acuña to try to be his brother

PORT ST. LUCIE – The Mets have so many players in spring training this season that they had to set up auxiliary lockers in the middle of the clubhouse. Lockers are bookending the couches in the middle of the room, six of them in use by some of the organization's top prospects, with pitchers Christian Scott, Mike Vasil, Dominic Hamel and Nate Lavender occupying four of them, and Jett Williams and Logan Gilbert occupying two on the other side of the room.

One of the temporary lockers contains

basketballs for the hoop above the equipment room. Another will likely go to Ji-Man Choi, the Mets' newest minor league signing.

So if you're wondering where

Luisangel Acuña, the Mets' top overall prospect in the system, is in the configuration of the lockers, don't worry, he occupies some prime real estate right next to shortstop Francisco Lindor.

"It feels good," the 21-year-old Acuña (photo) said through translator Alan Suriel on Saturday at Clover Park.

The infielder was the crown jewel of the trade deadline haul last summer, coming to the Mets from the Texas Rangers in exchange for Max Scherzer and cash considerations. The brother of Atlanta Braves star and reigning NL MVP Ronald Acuña Jr., Luisangel has some similar attributes, but they differ in positions and with the power tool.

At 5-foot-8, 181 pounds, Acuña has an explosive swing, but he's four inches shorter and doesn't have the same power that his brother in Atlanta possesses. But few players in the world have the same skill set as Ronald, one of the game's most elite players.

"With my brother, there aren't many people that can compare," he said through Suriel. "My brother is a talent that you see every 100 years. I'm going to continue to go out there, I'm going to compete and do what I do."

The younger Acuña is known more for his speed than his power. Acuña stole 57 bases last season in 67 attempts. He draws a lot of walks as well (53 in 533 plate

Double-A plate appearances in 2023).

In his first full season at Double-A, he slashed .294/.359/.410 with nine home runs. The Mets will start him in Triple-A

closer to the big leagues.
"I'm taking advantage of every opportunity that I get to play," Acuña said. "I think every opportunity that I get, I have to take

Syracuse this season, putting him one step

advantage and do what I have to do."

Acuña has played second base, shortstop and center field in the Rangers' system, but with the Mets he'll focus on the middle infield. The club plans to use him at second base this spring with Jett Williams playing shortstop. They'll play both positions

throughout the season, but the Mets see it best to give them each a singular focus during spring training.

Acuña will forever be playing in the shadow of his brother, but the Mets don't need him to try to be the same player. They want him to be the best version of himself he can be.

"He's just gotta be himself," said manager Carlos Mendoza. "He's got to go out and continue to learn and continue his development. That's the biggest thing for him. Ronald Acuña is obviously a special player, but we know the talent is here [with Luisangel], and it's important for him to understand who he is as a player and stick to it.

METS ADD CHOI

Choi was signed to a split contract to give the Mets another DH option. A 32-year-old left-handed hitter, he'll compete with DJ Stewart for the left-handed platoon DH position.

Choi missed most of the first half of 2023 with a strained Achilles tendon. When he returned, he hit .206 with six home runs for the Pittsburgh Pirates before being traded to the San Diego Padres. Shortly after the trade, he strained a rib cage muscle and fractured his ankle, ending his season.

Choi spent the 2017 season with the Yankees, mostly in Triple-A.

"His power will give you quality at-bats," Mendoza said. "I know who he is as a player and as a person, and I'm excited to have him in camp."

RAINED OUT

With rain in the forecast for the Treasure Coast region of Florida on Sunday, the Mets plan to close practice to fans. Position players will report with the first full-squad workout slated for Monday.

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A fast start for Toyota

Maker has high hopes for Daytona 500 but rain may affect race

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. – Denny Hamlin leaned into the window of Christopher Bell's winning Toyota to congratulate his Joe Gibbs Racing teammate on beating him in a Daytona 500 qualifying race.

Hamlin then gave Bell detailed directions to victory lane.

"Been to victory lane at Daytona a time or three," Hamlin wrote on social media. "Had to show (Bell) the way."

After a dismal showing in time trials for Sunday's season-opening Daytona 500, the Toyota camp roared back and swept the two 150-mile qualifying races Thursday night that set the field for "The Great American Race." The wins by Tyler Reddick of 23XI Racing – the team co-owned by Hamlin and Michael Jordan – and Bell marked the first sweep of the Daytona qualifying races for Toyota since 2014.

Adding in Hamlin's victory in the exhibition Clash at the Coliseum earlier this month, Toyota heads into the Daytona 500 a perfect 3 for 3 on the season in its new Camry XSE. With all nine Toyota drivers qualified for Sunday's field, the automaker is hoping to remain undefeated in 2024.

The nine entries are the most Toyota has had in the Daytona 500 since 2011.

Paul Doleshal, group manager of motorsports at Toyota North America, said the automaker was "disturbed" when no Toyota driver cracked the top 20 in time trials. Erik Jones had the fastest lap for the OEM at 22nd, and seven-time NASCAR champion Jimmie Johnson, the Legacy Motor Club co-owner and Jones' teammate, was 35th and forced to race his way into the 40-car field.

"I think we were a little bit disturbed – probably a strong word – but just surprised about the lack of qualifying speed," Doleshal said a day after the Toyota sweep. "But then felt that the car would race well, and that proved out, so we're encouraged with that."

Said Reddick: "This new Toyota Camry is truly a beast. It was a lot of fun to drive."

Hamlin, who is Toyota's only Daytona 500 winner with three previous victories, will be going for a fourth and initially was listed as the race favorite by FanDuel Sportsbook. The odds Friday had tilted slightly toward both Joey Logano, who will start from the pole for Team Penske in a new Ford Dark Horse Mustang, and Kyle Busch, who crashed in the qualifying race and will start 34th in a Chevrolet for Richard Childress Racing.

Logano will try to continue a hot streak for team owner Roger Penske. The run started last May when Penske won a record-extending 19th Indianapolis 500 with driver Josef Newgarden. He won the Cup championship in November with Ryan Blaney, won the Rolex 24 at Daytona sports car race last month for the first time since 1969, and now has his first driver on the pole for the Daytona 500.

"There's not a cooler race team that you can work for when it comes to motorsports in general. There's not another motorsports team in America that's decorated as much as Team Penske and what Roger Penske has done, whether it's in NASCAR, sports cars, IndyCar, you name it, the guy's been involved in all of it," Logano said. "One thing that's in common with all of it is he wins. That's where I want to be because of that reason, right? The guy wins, he does it right, he's professional. There's no corners ever cut

"Roger Penske has never gotten a Daytona 500 pole. Not very often that you can actually do something for the first time for 'The Captain.'"

The last driver to win the Daytona 500 from the pole was Dale Jarrett in 2000.

Weather is expected to play a role in Sunday's race, with rain expected to hit Daytonaover the weekend. The forecast is so poor that NASCAR on Friday decided to run the ARCA race scheduled for Saturday after Friday night's Truck Series race.

The final practice session ahead of the Daytona 500 was canceled Saturday morning because of rain at the track.

There's less chance of the Daytona 500 being prematurely altered from its scheduled Sunday afternoon start time, even though

NASCAR moved up the Clash by a full a day earlier this month because of heavy rain in Los Angeles. Unless the weather conditions are dangerous, NASCAR is most likely expected to wait it out as long as possible Sunday before deciding if the race needs to be postponed until Monday.


Ricky Stenhouse Jr. is the defending race winner for JTG-Daugherty Racing, and his victory extended a streak of three consecutive upset winners. Austin Cindric won for Penske as a rookie in 2022 and Michael McDowell of tiny Front Row Motorsports won in 2021.

McDowell was second-fastest in time trials and will start alongside fellow Ford driver Logano on the front row when the green flag drops. There's great anticipation to see how both Ford and Toyota perform in new cars designed for this season, while Chevrolet remains a mystery.

It's been 10 years since Hendrick Motorsports won its last Daytona 500 – in 2014 with Dale Earnhardt Jr. – and team owner Rick Hendrick wants the streak to end as the team launches its 40th anniversary season.

Hendrick driver Kyle Larson is 0 for 10 in the race – he joins Kyle Busch, Martin Truex Jr. and Brad Keselowski as former Cup champions stuck in double-digit Daytona 500 skids – but showed both speed and an ability to push others to the front in his qualifying race.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. – Lefty Driesell, the Hall of Fame coach whose folksy drawl belied a fiery on-court demeanor that put Maryland on the college basketball map and enabled him to rebuild several struggling programs, died Saturday. He was 92.

Maryland announced Driesell's death. Driesell died at his home in Virginia Beach, Va.

Driesell finished with 786 victories over parts of five decades and was the first coach to win more than 100 games at four NCAA Division I schools. He started at Davidson in 1960 before bringing Maryland into national prominence from 1969-86, a stay that ended with the cocaine-induced death of All-American Len Bias.

Driesell then won five regular-season conference titles over nine seasons at James Madison and finished with a successful run at Georgia State from 1997 to 2003.

"His contributions to the game go way beyond wins and losses, and he won a lot," former Duke coach Mike Krzyzewski said after Driesell finally made the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 2018. "It's an honor he's deserved for a long time."

Driesell launched the college basketball tradition known as Midnight Madness on Oct. 15, 1971. At three minutes after midnight on the first day of practice as sanctioned by the NCAA, Driesell had his players take a mandatory mile run on the track inside the Maryland football stadium.

The lighting was provided by the headlights of a few cars parked at one end of the stadium. The motivation came from Driesell's prodding and the estimated 800 students who gathered

to watch the unpublicized event.

"I've done a lot of crazy things to get attention, but that wasn't one of them," Driesell said years later. "I was just trying to get an early jump on practice. I had no idea what it was going to lead to."

Driesell also helped knock down racial barriers in the college game. He made George Raveling the first Black coach in the Atlantic Coast Conference by hiring him as an assistant in 1969. Driesell's effort to recruit Charlie Scott to play at Davidson helped make the future NBA star become the first African American scholarship athlete to attend North Carolina

Scott initially committed to Davidson before choosing UNC but acknowledged that Driesell paved the way.

"I think if there had never been a Lefty Driesell, there would never have been a Charlie Scott attending North Carolina," said Scott, who joined the Hall of Fame in 2018 with Driesell. "My commitment to go to Davidson really opened up all the other schools in the recruiting process."

Race played no factor in Driesell's effort to recruit the best players.

"He did so many great things in marketing the game and opened up so many doors for many African Americans players and coaches like myself," said Len Elmore, who played for Driesell at Maryland from 1971-74. "Lefty was a trailblazer and an innovator."

Driesell was inducted into the College Basketball Hall of Fame in 2007, but his entry into the Naismith shrine proved more elusive. He was a finalist four times before receiving the necessary 75% vote three months after his 86th birthday. The long snub, many speculated, came because Driesell was forced to resign

at Maryland in 1986 after Bias overdosed on cocaine in a campus dorm after being drafted by the Boston Celtics.

Maryland had to pay Driesell for the rest of his 10-year contract because it could find no wrongdoing on his part. But his departure meant Driesell never got to fulfill the declaration he made upon taking over in College Park – he would make Maryland the "UCLA of the East."

Under Driesell, the Terrapins didn't enjoy the success John Wooden had at UCLA. Maryland failed to reach the Final Four during his 17-year stay, but the Terps won or shared five ACC regular-season titles and captured the league tournament in 1984 – on Driesell's fifth trip to the final.

One of Driesell's best teams never made it to the postseason. In the 1974 ACC championship game, the fourth-ranked Terrapins lost in overtime to No. 1 North Carolina State 103-100 during a time when only the conference champion advanced to the NCAA Tournament.

A week later, a Maryland team featuring future NBA starters Tom McMillen, John Lucas and Elmore turned down a bid to the NIT, which it had won two years earlier. N.C. State went on to win the 1974 NCAA title, ending UCLA's seven-year streak as national champions.

"Lefty's team that year," Krzyzewski said, "was probably as good as 20 national champions."

Born on Christmas Day in 1931, Charles Grice Driesell grew up in Norfolk, Va. He was a star basketball player for Granby H.S. in Norfolk before attending Duke.

After working at the Ford Motor Co., Driesell took a job as a junior varsity football

and basketball coach at Granby in 1954 after convincing his wife, Joyce, that he could withstand the pay cut by also selling encyclopedias. He eventually was promoted to head coach of the varsity team before moving to Newport News H.S., where he won 57 straight games.

In 1960, he took a job at Davidson, which was coming off an 11th consecutive losing season. He went 9-14 in his debut, one of only two times over an entire season in which he would finish with a losing record as a college coach.

Driesell won three Southern Conference tournaments and five regular-season championships at Davidson over nine years and went 176-65 before being hired at Maryland. He won 348 games with the Terrapins, a long-lasting school record that was finally broken in 2006 by Gary Williams.

After leaving Maryland, Driesell was hired in 1988 by James Madison, a small Virginia school that finished 10-18 in 1987. He went 16-14 in his first year, 20-11 in his second season and led the Dukes to four straight NIT appearances before going to the NCAA Tournament in 1994.

Driesell compiled a 159-111 record at James Madison and enjoyed continued success at Georgia State. The Panthers were 29-5 in 2000-01 and upset Wisconsin in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament. Two years later, he retired in the early stages of his 41st season with a career record of 786-394. At the time, he ranked fourth in NCAA Division I wins, behind only Dean Smith, Adolph Rupp and Bob Knight.

Driesell is survived by four children. While at Duke, Driesell eloped with Joyce and got married in December 1952. She died in 2021.

A JUAN-TRACK MIND

With Soto, it's World Series or bust for Yankees this season

AMPA - One of Gene Michael's tenets for building championship Yankee teams was left-handed power in Yankee Stadium, which was woefully absent in recent years. But while the Yankees may have addressed that void in a big way with their acquisition of Juan Soto from San Diego, in doing so they violated another Gene Michael principle which was never give up good prospects for a player who isn't signed.

Considering the circumstances, the Yankees have never made a trade with more potential risk than the deal for Soto in which they sacrificed Michael King, who was projected to be their No. 3 and possibly even their No. 2 starter behind Gerrit Cole, plus the minor league pitcher of the year in Drew Thorpe and two useful back-of-the-rotation/swing guys in Randy Vasquez and Jhony Brito. The prospect of having Aaron Judge and Soto, possibly the most explosive righty-lefty hitting combo in baseball, backto-back in the lineup has Aaron Boone understandably psyched about the Bombers this year. Championship or bust as he put it the other day.

And that's what it has to be. Because even if Soto has another monster year, should the Yankees fail to reach the World Series for the 15th straight year, or, even worse, miss the postseason altogether like last year, due to a shortage of starting pitching, the deal must be considered a bust. It would leave the Yankees with another ring-less season and at the mercy of Soto's agent Scott Boras, who still thinks he's going to get a \$500 million deal for the lefty slugger.

No question, losing out on

Yoshinobu Yamamoto was a gut punch for the Yankees, making signing Marcus Stroman for mid-rotation depth a necessity. But as much as Boone is going to bask at the sight of Soto hitting bombs this spring, he can be forgiven for also casting a wary eye on whoever is starting the games

So far at least the news has been good on the starting pitching front. **Nestor Cortes** is reporting no ill effects with his rotator cuff which shut him down in August last year, while Carlos Rodon has reportedly already been clocking 97 mph as opposed to 92-93 this time last year at the outset of camp. Both have had the experience of pitching at the top of the rotation and both have had a history of injuries. If they can avoid the latter and come close to the former, this could indeed be a special seasons for the Yankees.

But there's no getting around all the injuries that have plagued the Yankees these past few years, and with Vazquez, Brito and Thorpe gone, the reinforcement brigade has been thinned to two - righties Will Warren and Chase Hampton - both of whom have shown considerable promise but are still said to be a ways away from contributing at the major league level.


The good news for the Yankees is that the rest of the American League East teams all have issues, none more so it would seem now than the defending division champion Orioles who, a week after seemingly addressing their biggest need - a No. 1 starter - with the trade with Milwaukee for Corbin Burnes - lost last year's ace, Kyle **Bradish**, with an elbow injury that is looking ominously like a coming Tommy John surgery. There are also legitimate questions about Craig Kimbrel adequately replacing Felix Bautista as their closer.

Meanwhile, the Rays are counting on raw rookie Ryan Pepiot, who they obtained from the Dodgers for last year's ace Tyler **Glasnow**, to anchor their rotation while waiting on the midseason returns of last year's Tommy John victims Shane McClanahan and **Jeffrey Springs**. They will also be without their best player, Wander **Franco**, indefinitely as he stands accused of sexual abuse of a 14-year-old girl in the Dominican Republic. Hard to see how they'll come close to the 99 wins they had as division runners-up last

And the Red Sox did very little to improve their lot either other than signing the maddeningly inconsistent Lucas Giolito for their rotation, while the Blue Jays, who lost (and didn't adequately replace) clubhouse leaders Matt Chapman and Brandon Belt, remain an underperforming enigma waiting for Vladimir Guerrero Jr. to ever live up to his ability.

o say what you will, even with losing out on Yamamoto, the Yankees did more than any team in the AL East this winter to improve off last season which Brian Cashman rightfully termed "a disaster." If the starting pitching holds up, the Soto deal could have the same effect as another trade the Yankees made for a left-handed power hitter in Roger Maris 60-plus years ago, after they'd finished an uncharacteristic third and then went on to win five straight pennants.

Of course that's assuming they'll be willing to pay another \$500 million Boras ransom for keeping Soto long term.



It's A MADD WORLD...

A year after signing Xander Bogaerts to an astounding 11-year/\$280M free agent contract, the Padres have announced they are moving him to second base and replacing him at shortstop with the more defensively efficient **Ha-Seong Kim**. This is the second time in recent years the Padres have given a shortstop a contract of around \$300 million and then moved him off the position. In February 2021, the Padres signed Fernando Tatis Jr. to an historic 14-year/\$340M deal and anointed him as their franchise shortstop, only to have him miss the entire 2022 season with an injury and a PED suspension. By the time Tatis came back, they'd signed Bogaerts and he was moved to right field. ... Nice to see the A's and Oakland making nicey-nice again in the midst of their ugly divorce after a "positive" meeting Thursday in which they came closer to an agreement that would allow the A's to extend their agreement with the Coliseum

that runs out after this season. The A's have tentatively planned to open a new ballpark in Las Vegas in 2028 at the earliest and need a place to play in the interim, the most preferable being the Coliseum where they would continue to receive the \$67 million a year from their TV contract which is only good if they play in the Bay Area. In truth, they really should take the advice of Las Vegas mayor **Carolyn Goodman.** who stunned the Super Bowl media horde by saying the proposed Tropicana Hotel site for the A's stadium in Las Vegas "doesn't make sense" and they should really go back to the bureaucrats in Oakland and work out a new plan there. I agree. The A's move to Las Vegas from the 10th largest TV market to the 40th - makes no sense and will doom them as the lowest revenue team in baseball. They already have the worst owner in baseball in John Fisher.

Romo fumbled his chance after Kelce's Reid outburst

here are occasions when a picture doesn't tell the whole story.

Like the moment CBS' Super Bowl cameras caught **Travis Kelce** screaming in **Andy Reid's** face and bumping the Chiefs' coach, nearly knocking him off his feet, in the second quarter. The stunning shot couldn't stand alone. It begged for a reaction.

Yet, Tony Romo, CBS No. 1 NFL analyst had none. Instead, Romo was content describing what over millions of viewers could already see.

"After the fumble he (Kelce) comes over to Andy (Reid). He goes 'keep me in;" Romo said. "What happened on the fumble is he wasn't in (the game). **Noah Gray** went in and he had to block."

What did Romo really think? After all, CBS is paying him \$17 million per year for his opinions, right? Did Romo think it was just a heat of the moment reaction by Kelce? Did he have a problem with what was a sideline assault by a superstar on his coach? Was there anything humorous Romo could glean from the ugly incident?

After all, a big – and appealing – part of Romo's broadcast game is his sense of humor, right?

Romo's decision to go bland and neither lower the boom on Kelce, or excuse him for getting tangled up in frustration, was major. It left a big hole in CBS Supe production. Romo's partner, Jim Nantz, rarely gets in the opinion business during a game making Romo's omission even more glaring. During the halftime report, Norman Julius Esiason took Kelce to task, but his cutting commentary was likely delivered while millions of American toilets were flushing.

BRADY'S TAKE

Meanwhile, in a peek at what could be on the horizon, it's worth examining how **Tom Brady**, who joins Fox as its No. 1 NFL analyst next season, handled the Kelce-Reid tango.

Brady recognized he was in no position to chastise Kelce. To do so would have risked being branded a phony long before his booth debut.

"I don't mind seeing it (Kelce getting in Reid's face) 'cause I was a part of a lot of those things," Brady said Monday on his SiriusXM "Get Up" show. "Emotions are so high. You are definitely not centered. You're not in a meditative state at



that point."

If Brady made this comment during the game telecast, he would have drawn two different reactions. Some viewers would have ripped him for letting Kelce off the hook. Others would have appreciated his players-eye view of the situation.

Especially when delivered by a former player who was often seen losing his temper on the sidelines.

CLARK GETS SOCIAL

Once you get through **Ryan Clark's** three-minute video tribute to himself on X, his message to ESPN suits is not hard to decipher: Your contract offers sucks and I'm about to move on.

Clark's ESPN contract expired and he's negotiating a new one, apparently through social media.

Clark, a passionate, outspoken, insightful analyst, makes a case for how his hard work, grinding and tunnel-vision approach has led to him becoming one of the top NFL analysts on ESPN's roster. Clark leaves the impression that he works harder than his colleagues at the network.

Clark paying homage to his own

work-ethic leads to the following question: Isn't drive and preparation part of the job description? It's not special. It's what you're supposed to do.

The Bristol Faculty may not be thrilled with Clark attempting to put pressure on them through social media posts. Also, might potential employers at other networks see it as a red flag and become skittish dealing with someone who goes public when he has an issue with the company?

JJ TO THE RESCUE

Like the Batman signal lighting up the dark Gotham night, one can envision ESPN using a glowing basketball to make an urgent call for the man who invented hoops, **IJ Redick**.

Redick's mission: To parachute in and save ESPN's No. 1 NBA broadcast team.

The coming of Redick might actually inject some much-needed personality to the combo of **Mike Breen** and **Doris Burke**. They have delivered a certain blandness during their few performances together this season.

AROUND THE DIAL

TNT Sports brainiacs have no problem teaming **Draymond Green** with **Charles Barkley** for their alternative NBA All-Star telecast Sunday night on TruTV. Green is fresh off an indefinite suspension for striking Suns center **Jusuf Nurkic**. No doubt Adam Silver had to bless TNT's

decision to reward Green for bad behavior. Yet the unpredictable couple — Barkley/Green — will entice eyeballs to the AltCast. And that's all that matters to the commissioner.



"I know that there's an aisle in between, but it's not a barrier. It's invisible. You guys need to reach your hands across. You need to cooperate. You need to compromise, and you need to coexist. This is the greatest country in the world and it's the best when Republicans and Democrats are working together. Nobody on either side has all the answers. You've got to listen to each other."

Larry Doby Jr. politely chastising members of Congress while accepting the Congressional Gold Medal on behalf of his late father baseball Hall of Famer Larry Doby

hen a statue of Jack Roosevelt Robinson was stolen, mutilated and burned last month in Wichita, Kan., by a bunch of slacked jawed, tiny membered cretins, it seems the more things change ... you know the rest.

For Larry Doby Jr., son of the Hall of Famer who was the second man of color to break baseball's segregation policy, he could only vent.

"Oh, my goodness," he tells the Daily News in disgust. "I thought we had moved passed that. You'd think that

we've already fought those battles and it just seems sometimes we're going backwards. It's crazy. I just don't understand what is in people's minds."

Doby Jr. is on a break from his day/night job of being a rigger – someone who builds stages for performers. His boss is Rock and Roll Hall of Famer Billy Joel. They've been together for a while.

"Oh, my goodness like 28 years or something like that," says the 66-year-old Montclair, N.J. resident with a chuckle. After traveling around the world with the Piano Man, in about two weeks it's back to work with another gig.

"We're playing Tampa with Sting in the Bucs Stadium," he says.

Doby's dad had it just as tough as Jackie Robinson, but that spotlight wasn't as bright as many of the Cleveland writers treated him shabbily and called him moody and sullen.

"When he reported to the Indians, [with] 25 players, a manager

who didn't want him and three coaches, he was introduced in the locker room and five guys shook his hand," says Jerry Izenberg, long-time columnist with The Star Ledger. He is the author of "Larry Doby in Black and White: The Story of a Baseball Pioneer" due out in March by Skyhorse Publishing. "Everybody else gave him a dead fish [handshake] and two of them turned and faced the wall."

Izenberg and Doby, raised in Paterson, N.J., had a long friendship though it got off to a strange start.

"My doorbell rang, and Larry was standing in the snow. He said, 'What do you drink?'" recalls Izenberg, 93, now residing in Las Vegas of that 1967 encounter. "Those days I drank a lot. I said if it's wet, I'll drink it. He said. 'I'll be here at seven with a bottle' and turned around and walked away into the snow

"I couldn't figure out if I wrote a piece that offended him because I was his hometown columnist. He comes at seven with a bottle. He puts it on the kitchen table, and we didn't get up from that table till 10 or 11 the next morning."

Doby Jr. helped Izenberg with

the book because he noted, "my father had a really hard life and as a result of that, he did not trust any people.

"You are the one that he trusted."

Doby Jr. wasn't the baseball player his father was, not many were. He earned a baseball scholarship to Duke University and played a bit in the minors for the White Sox but had his education to fall back on with a major in history and philosophy.

"I was determined to graduate college because my father instilled that in me," says Doby Jr. "I wanted to play sports. That didn't work out, but I was going to get that piece of paper one way or the other. Duke was a wonderful experience."

When Doby Jr. played sports (baseball, basketball and football in high school, baseball and football at Duke), his father was on the road coaching.

"He was a father/coach," recalls Doby Jr. "He was very cognizant that he did not want to push me, and he actually erred on the side of not enough coaching. As he would always tell me, listen to your coaches. I'm not there."

But when he did, it was odd.

"When he then took an interest in me to coach, I was like, 'Really? Now you want to coach?" he says laughing. "Luckily, that didn't last long and then I was all ears but in the beginning it was weird because he really was a hands off kind of guy as a coach.

"He was hands on as a father but hands off as a coach."

Getting back to his December admonishment to the politicians in the room that included Speaker of the House Mike Johnson and Senators Mitch McConnell and Cory Booker, how did that happen?

"You have these congressmen

that sit across the aisle from each other and it's the greatest country in the world, but it's the greatest country in the world when those people are working together," says Doby Jr. "Nobody knows everything, and we can always learn something. To the day you die, you can learn something."


Some just don't want to learn. The destruction of the Jackie Robinson statue in Wichita struck a nerve with Doby Jr. because his father had statues erected in his honor most notably at Cleveland's' Progressive Field.

"It's hard for us to fathom that a certain person couldn't drink out of the same water fountain, couldn't use the same bathroom. couldn't eat in the same restaurants, couldn't stay in the same hotels," says Doby Jr. with the quiet undertone much like his dad. "That's almost like a foreign concept.

When Cleveland won Game 4 of the 1948 World Series, Doby became the first Black man to homer in a Fall Classic. Winning pitcher Steve Gromek and Doby hugged each other with big smiles after the game. They went on to defeat the Boston Braves in six games capturing Cleveland's first championship





since 1920. Doby hit .318 for the Series. He also lead the American League in homers twice (1952 and 1954) and RBI once (1954).

The photo of the two of them went viral courtesy of the Associated Press. Let's just say most of America was appalled. They couldn't fathom that a Black man and a white man could smile, hug and touch each other cheek to cheek in the warm embrace of victory.

The photo of the two of them hugging is on the back of Doby's Congressional Gold Medal.

Gromek stated when he returned home to Hamtramck, Mich., someone told him, "You could have just shook his hand."

Some members on the team did

help him like future Hall of Famer Joe Gordon who offered to play catch with the rookie from the Negro Leagues.

After all his struggles and accomplishments, it seemed like Doby would never make it into the Hall of Fame. It was now up to the Veteran's Committee and Isenberg had written columns questioning why Doby wasn't in.

Doby told him to stop trying, but Izenberg gave it one last shot.

"I wrote the nastiest column I could possibly write about the lack of traction in getting Doby in the Hall and mailed it to every member of the Veteran's Committee," says Izenberg. "One of them answered me and it started, Dear

Asshole, Monte [Irvin] and Yogi [Berra] and I have been advocating Larry's cause ever since the Veteran's Committee got a chance on him. So why don't you get your fat ass off the couch and go out and try to get the votes we need. Signed Ted Williams.

"They used to leave their gloves on the outfield grass when they came in. So, Doby's bending over to pick up his glove when somebody swats him in the ass, and he turns around and it's Ted Williams. He says, 'Keep your head up buddy. You're gonna be a great player.' Williams recognized it right away."

Doby was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1998 and he

passed in 2003.

Doby Jr. realized his father was a great dad even though he was on the road coaching or becoming the second Black man to manage in the Majors behind Frank Robinson.

Once a number two, always a number two?

"We root for the underdog, and we want somebody to succeed especially when they've had difficulties," says Doby. "We've kind of lost that compassion."

Something that both his parents instilled in him. With both his mother, the glue of the family and his father's source of strength, and his father gone, Doby Jr. knows his dad is still

with him.

"If you don't miss [your father] then that probably means you didn't have a good relationship with him, so I miss him every day," says Doby Jr. who grew up with his four sisters. "I'm very lucky to have him as a father and very lucky that people see fit to honor him now even though it's bittersweet because he's not here."

s for those who thought Doby didn't belong in the Hall because it took a while for him to get in, Izenberg set the record straight.

"What do you think Babe Ruth's average would have been if he had a death threat every night?" says Izenberg.
